FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK...

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK...

It is my pleasure to present the NIPCCD **Annual Report** for the year **2021-22**. This Report highlights the great strides made by the Institute towards delivering quality systems in training, counselling services and research in areas of topical concerns related to women and child development.

Under the able guidance of Smt. Smriti Zubin Irani, Hon'ble Minister, WCD, NIPCCD is undertaking steps for strategic reforms in order to meet the diverse needs of women and children across the country in a fast changing social milieu. We are thus reorganizing our competencies for transformative solutions keeping in view the changes ushered in policies, legislations, programmes and the revolution of information, communication and technology to secure long-term success.

NIPCCD has successfully organized a record 417 online and offline programmes (from 1st April, 2021 to 31st March, 2022) which saw a participation of 32461 officials and functionaries of Government Organizations and Civil Society Organizations. During the year eight research studies/documentations have been duly completed. The Institute through its enriching activities is also gearing up and marching in various capacities supporting MWCD towards the purpose of rolling out the Umbrella Schemes across the states. In this context, in order to discuss about areas of expectations from NIPCCD from the states for Work Plan 2022-23, a virtual meeting with Principal State Secretaries, Directors and State Officials of the Department of Women and Child Development was organized on 11th February, 2022 under the Chairmanship of Shri Indevar Pandey, Secretary, MWCD, and inputs received have been incorporated in NIPCCD curriculum.

The Institute runs a full-time One-Year Diploma Course, namely, Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling (ADCGC) in affiliation with Sri Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University and recognized by the Rehabilitation Council of India. Presently, 17th Batch of ADCGC is running with an enrollment of 32 students. Regional Centre, Guwahati, also inaugurated One-Year Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling on October 20, 2021 in order to cater to requirements of Northeastern Region of India in affiliation with Gauhati University. The Institute also provided Internship to 30 Research Students pursuing Research Projects in Universities/Colleges in the field of Women & Child and Gender issues.

NIPCCD is immensely contributing in the area pertaining to mental health and counselling. During the year 2021-22, the Child Guidance Centres functional at NIPCCD Headquarters and Regional Centres registered a total of 335 cases, and follow-up for various interventions were done in case of 2690 children and a total of 3204 Consultation Sessions were conducted, which included comprehensive diagnostic evaluation of child abilities, social adaptation, behaviour, skills, talents, interests, academic learning and personality characteristics. The Adolescent Guidance Service Centre at NIPCCD, which works with the vision of promoting positive mental health of adolescents, registered 67 new cases of adolescents, with 178 follow-up cases, and 711 consultations for various assessments and therapies during the year 2021-22.

During 2021-22, a plethora of activities have kept us all fully engaged. NIPCCD played an integral role along with MWCD towards nationwide celebrations of 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav', on the eve of 'National Girl Child Day' on 24th January, 2022 and International Women's Day Week from 1st to 8th March, 2022. NIPCCD was involved in various programmes related to Women Safety and Empowerment in partnership with organisations like Bureau of Police Research and Development

(BPR&D) and NIMHANS. NIPCCD also celebrated 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav' on the theme "Children Ideas, Rights & Nutrition" from 14-21 November, 2021. During this week, visits were made by NIPCCD Officials to 17 Child Care Institutions (CCIs) including Government Observation Homes, Children Home for Special Needs, and Specialized Adoption Agencies spread across 16 States/UTs and various activities for children in collaboration with Ministry of Culture and Ministry of Environment were organised.

NIPCCD also celebrated the Breast Feeding Week (1st-7th August, 2021) and Rashtriya Poshan Maah 1st-30th September, 2021 Headquarters in New Delhi and its Regional Centres through various Outreach Activities on Nutrition Issues in Schools, CCIs and Community. Special emphasis was given on Nutri-garden/Poshan Vatika through visits to Anganwadi Centres and organization of various training programmes. In accordance with the directions of Cabinet Secretariat and MWCD, a Special Campaign was undertaken by NIPCCD from 02nd October, 2021 to 31st October, 2021. Some of the major achievements included review of 7044 physical files and weeding out of 494 files, old scrap material generating revenue and freeing out space at the Institute. Similarly, Swachhata Pakhwada (1st-15th March, 2022) and Hindi Pakhwada (14th to 30th September, 2021) were also aptly celebrated.

The Institute is focusing on digitization by use of information and communications technology in a big way. The Institute is pleased to present its quarterly 'e-Bulletin', initiated to provide latest updates on the ongoing activities of NIPCCD at its Headquarters in New Delhi as well as its five Regional Centres, inspirational stories, case studies and best practices of the States along with updates from MWCD. I am thankful and express my gratitude to all stakeholders who have contributed immensely in realizing the Institute's goals and objectives.

It has always been truly inspiring and heart-warming for the Institute for receiving incessant support from MWCD for execution of its curricula and various other activities. The Institute is strengthening its accounts related practices through various measures. In the year 2021, NIPCCD has been extended the responsibility of management of funds for execution of the "PM CARES for Children Scheme" at the behest of MWCD.

I am sure that NIPCCD **Annual Report 2021-22** will present insights into the women and child development domain to inspire each other, progress together and provide valuable information for planning future course of action. I once again assure that our mission in making NIPCCD into an Institute of Excellence in education, research and training in all disciplines related to development of women and children will be continued with much more vigore, innovation and inclusiveness in times to come.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

2.1 The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development, popularly known as NIPCCD, is a premier organization devoted to promotion of voluntary action, research, training and documentation in the overall domain of women and child development. It was established in New Delhi, in the year 1966, as an autonomous Institution under the Societies Registration Act of 1860, and functions under the aegis of the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India. It has its Headquarters in New Delhi and five Regional Centres at Guwahati (1978), Bengaluru (1980), Lucknow (1982), Indore (2001), and Mohali (2019) to cater to regionspecific requirements.

The Institute focuses on essential and need-based programmes for holistic development of children and their protection, and for creating awareness regarding women's empowerment and gender issues, especially women's rights-political, social and economic. The current thrust areas of the Institute relating to child development are maternal and child health and nutrition, early childhood care and education, childhood disabilities, positive mental health in children and child care support services. The activities of the Institute in the area of women development are geared to support national policies and programmes for women's empowerment through training, research and documentation. The Institute is also focusing on gender planning and mainstreaming, gender budgeting, economic and political empowerment of women, prevention of sexual harassment at work place, prevention of gender-related violence such as female foeticide, female infanticide, trafficking of women and children, child marriage, etc.

2.2 The Objectives of the Institute are to:

- Develop and promote voluntary action in social development;
- ii. Promote and develop relevant need based programmes in pursuance of the National Policy for Children;
- iii. Evolve measures for coordinating between governmental action and voluntary action in social development;

- iv. Develop framework and perspective for organizing children's programmes through governmental and voluntary efforts; and
- v. Establish liaison with international, National and regional agencies, research institutions, universities and technical bodies engaged in activities similar to those of the Institute.

The vision of NIPCCD is to be seen as an Institute of global repute in Women and Child Development & Empowerment issues by developing partnerships and linkages with National and International agencies and making its training and research activities relevant to the needs of its varying stakeholders.

IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES DURING 2021-22

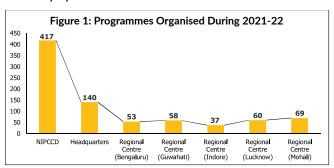
2.3 Training and Capacity Building

Training is one of the core activities of the Institute. The Training Programmes conducted by NIPCCD cover the major schemes introduced by the Ministry. All the major schemes of the Ministry have been classified under three umbrella schemes, viz., Mission Poshan 2.0, Mission Vatsalya and Mission Shakti for effective implementation. The Institute conducts nearly 400-450 training programmes in a calendar year apart from various research-based activities. These courses included Job Training Courses, Skill Development Courses, Induction Training, Vertical Training, Refresher Training, Training of Trainers, and other Programmes on contemporary need-based themes. In the past two years, the Institute also undertook virtual training programmes as an effective mode to reach out to the beneficiaries. As a mandate of the Institute, capacity building and awareness generation programmes were organized in the areas of child protection, child development, women development, and Anganwadi Services Scheme.

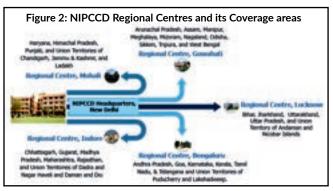
During the year 2021–22 (from 1st April, 2021 to 31st March, 2022), NIPCCD organized 417 Online & Offline programmes (Figure 1) which included orientation courses, sensitization/skill training programmes, workshops and consultation meets/review meets covering programmes on various schemes of MWCD as well as contemporary



need-based themes. The Institute also conducted programmes on subjects of topical interest in various fields to highlight the role of civil society organizations and government departments in tackling emerging social problems including those having a bearing on the welfare and development of women and children, and strengthening the service delivery system.



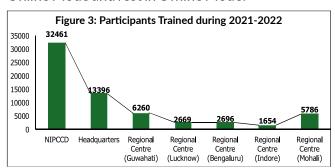
At NIPCCD Headquarters, 140 Online & Offline Training Programmes were organized, and the Regional Centres at Mohali, Bengaluru, Guwahati, Lucknow and Indore organized 277 programmes in order to cater to the regional requirements of training in the field of women and child development in the country. All the Regional Centres have to cater to region-specific jurisdiction with States/UTs (Figure 2) for training and research so as to have Pan-India coverage and collaborate with organizations/institutions for liaisoning and networking.



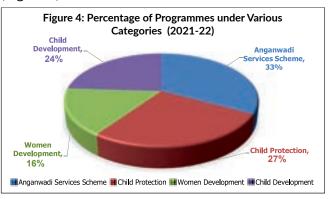
Eminent resource persons having expertise in domain areas of child development, women development, child protection, health, sanitation were invited for online sessions so as to enrich the learning experience of the participants and also to have an idea of good practices being followed in the states in order to improve overall health, nutritional status and ensure safety and well-being of women and children. The Resource Persons invited for the

programmes were from varied fields and included doctors, lawyers, government officials, professors from Universities, Public Prosecutors, Nutrition Consultants, Counselling & Rehabilitation Psychologists, Psychiatrists, Administrators, Chief Medical Health Officers, District Prosecution Officers, District Programme Officers, Retired Government Officials, and Principal Scientists, etc. Senior Officials from various Ministries, viz., Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Jal Shakti, etc., were also invited to deliver and address sessions pertinent to various issues related to women and child development.

A total of **32461** participants attended the training programmes during the year 2021-22 organized by NIPCCD Headquarters and its Regional Centres (Figure 3). A total of 383 Programmes were held in Online Mode and rest in Offline Mode.

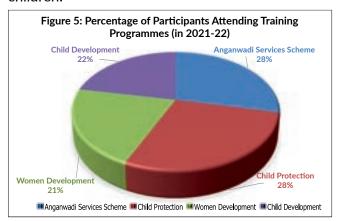


Out of the 417 programmes organized by NIPCCD, 137 Programmes (33% of programmes) were organized for Capacity Building of Anganwadi Services Scheme Functionaries under Umbrella ICDS followed by 112 programmes (27%) in the area of Child Protection, 68 programmes (16%) on issues related to Women Development, and 100 Programmes (24%) organized on issues related to Child Development including Mental Health issues (Figure 4).



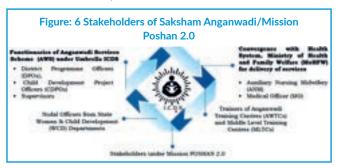


With regard to capacity building of functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS, 9243 (28%) functionaries including DPOs, CDPOs, Supervisors and Anganwadi Workers were given online training on service delivery mechanism for improving health and nutrition status of women and children.



2.3.1 Capacity Building of Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS

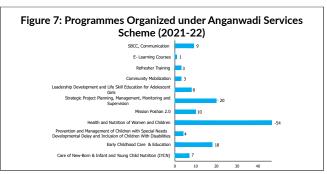
Children are the future of our country. Well-being of children is essential for country's development as they contribute to the future human resource of the country. To strengthen nutritional content, delivery, outreach, and outcomes, the Government is merging the Supplementary Nutrition Programme and Poshan Abhiyan to launch Saksham Anganwadi and POSHAN 2.0 which includes Umbrella ICDS-Anganwadi Services, Poshan Abhiyan, Scheme for Adolescent Girls, and National Crèche Scheme.



As an apex Institution for training of functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS, NIPCCD organized courses for DPOs, CDPOs, Supervisors, Anganwadi Workers and trainers (Figure 6); Vertical Training Programmes for functionaries at block level; and several Workshops/Consultation Meets. For building up

the capabilities of functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS, the Institute organized several orientation programmes, refresher and skill training programmes as mentioned in Figure 7. A National Webinar on "Role of Adolescent Girls in Strengthening Mission POSHAN 2.0, (Participants: 100 Adolescent Girls), was organized by Training Division of NIPCCD, New Delhi on 24th September, 2021.





Maximum programmes for Capacity Building of Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS were conducted on the theme of Health and Nutrition of Women and Children which are the major services rendered under Anganwadi Services Scheme, for example, a Webinar on "Dietary Diversity for Management of SAM in Children through POSHAN Vatika" for Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme was organized on 23 September, 2021 (Participants: 92), by Regional Centre, Guwahati. Similarly, an Online Orientation Training on Survival and Development of Young Children (Under Two) for Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme from Aspirational Districts was organized from 12-14 October, 2021 by Training Division of NIPCCD, New Delhi. The programme was envisaged to help in designing the Annual



Programme Implementation Plan (APIP) and develop best practices for the States/ UTs including management of Severely Acute Malnourished Children.

Nearly 18 programmes under Anganwadi Services spreaded over the theme of Early Childhood Care and Education. In this context, a training programme of State Level Master Trainers (SLMTs) of Odisha on Implementation of Annual Contextualized ECCE Curriculum (NUA ARUNIMA) for Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS was organized from 13–19 July, 2021 by Training Division of NIPCCD, New Delhi.

A few programmes on Project Management, Monitoring and Supervision, Community Mobilization and Communication Counselling Skills were also conducted to handhold functionaries for proper delivery of services

2.3.2 Child Protection

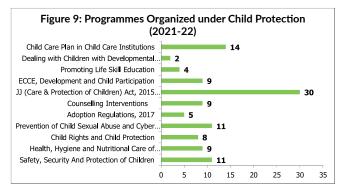
The Institute, as a nodal resource agency, has been entrusted with the responsibility of training and capacity building of functionaries at the National and Regional-levels under the centrally-sponsored Child Protection Services (CPS) scheme (erstwhile Integrated Child Protection Scheme) under the umbrella Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) for supporting children in difficult circumstances in all the States/UTs. Further, the Government has conceptualized Mission Vatsalya to comprehensively address various challenges concerning children.

During the year 2021-22, the Institute and its Regional Centres organized 112 online and offline Training Programmes on Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012 mainly to sensitize participants about sexual offences committed against children, apprise them about POCSO Act, 2012, and orient them about their roles and responsibilities in protecting the rights of children (Figure 9).



Similarly, 30 Orientation Training/Workshops for the members of Juvenile Justice Board (JJB) and Officials of Child Protection Scheme were organized in order to sensitize participants about the Act and its recent Amendments along with discussing roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders in implementation of the Act. The Training Programmes also provided an opportunity for sharing good practices for strengthening implementation of the Act. The programmes on JJ Act, covered various important aspects like minimum standards of care, individual care plan, non-institutional alternative care, case intervention under the Act, rehabilitation & social integration of children in need of care & protection/children in conflict with law, etc.

The Institute also organized various orientation programmes/sensitization programmes/workshops/webinars on issues of Child Rights and Safety. Special emphasis was laid on training functionaries of Child Care Institutions on health and nutrition issues.



adolescent health, promoting life skill education and mental health by enhancing counselling skills of functionaries of Child Protection Services. A total of nine programmes were organized in order to address health and nutrition issues in Child Care Institutions. A Training Programme was organized by State Child Protection Society, Child Protection Services, and Department of Social Welfare in collaboration with NIPCCD Regional Centre, Guwahati. The Training was attended by various stakeholders and after the training, the DCPOs of selected districts started the identification of hotspot areas where CiSS are spotted, such as railway stations, slums and dumping yards.



2.3.3 Women Development

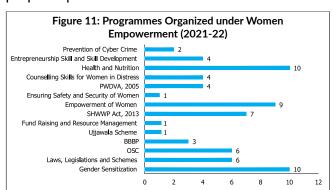
NIPCCD is also responsible for promotion of voluntary action research, training and documentation in the overall domain of women development in order to ensure overall survival, development, protection and participation of women. NIPCCD has played a pivotal part in accelerating the gender equality journey and empowering women or women empowerment to today's era of women-led empowerment.

The Institute primarily organized 68 online and offline training programmes on Women Development and Empowerment (Figure 11). Specific issues like Sexual Harassment of Women at Work Place (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (07 programmes) and Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005 (04 programmes) for officials from Government Organizations as well as Civil Society Organizations. The recent case-laws and Juridical Interpretations of provisions of these laws besides suggesting solutions to the field problems in implementation of the laws were also highlighted in the programmes.

Gender-based violence attributes to an unequal power relation between men and women. The Institute conducted several gender sanitation programmes in order to counter gender-based violence and capacity building of women. The Institute also organized various online programmes on safety and security of women and children against cybercrime, workshop on development of entrepreneurship skills, etc. Various programmes for functionaries of Ujjawala, Swadhar and One Stop Centre Scheme were organized in order to orient and empower them on issues of health, nutrition, sanitation as well as sharing guidelines for proper implementation of the scheme.



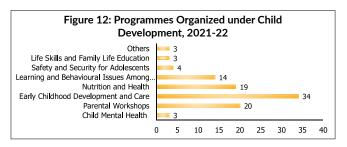
A National Webinar on "Addressing Comprehensive Needs of Adolescent Girls#ladkiyanjahan khusiyanwahan", was organized by the Women Development Division of NIPCCD, New Delhi, on 24 January 2022 (Participants: 3000). Also, a Regional Webinar on "Promoting Mental & Physical Well-Being among Women", was organized by Regional Centre, Mohali on 25 February, 2022 (Participants: 1091).





2.3.4 Child Development

The vision of the Institute is to be seen as an Institute of global repute in the area of child development. During the year 2021-22, 100 online and offline programmes were organized with themes like early childhood development, mental health and well-being of children, learning and behavioural issues among children including ADHD, autism, specific learning disabilities, etc. (Figure 12).



A total of 20 Online and Offline Parental Workshops were organized highlighting the topics of special education, psychological counselling and psychiatric intervention, speech therapy, building partnership between teachers and parents for holistic development of children.

A total 19 online and offline programmes were

organized for various stakeholders on the theme "Nutrition and Health" which included topics like Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF), Nutritious and Safe Food Handling, Life Style Diseases and their Prevention among Late Adolescents and Youth, and Causes & Consequences of Anaemia on Development & Scholastic Performance of Children, etc. A National Webinar on Nutri Garden: A Sustainable Approach to Nutrition Security was held on 30th September, 2021 (Participants: 260) by the Child Development Division of NIPCCD, New Delhi. Also, a Regional Webinar on "Importance of Early Intervention for Children with Delayed Development", was organized by Regional Centre, Mohali on 22 March, 2022 (Participants: 548).

2.4 Research/Evaluation Studies/ Documentation / Compilations

The Headquarters and its Regional Centres undertake research in areas falling within its mandate. Evaluation studies are conducted to assess the impact of ongoing schemes or projects on Women and Child Development, as an independent initiative, or at the request of sponsoring Department/agency. Documentation of the research work in the form of reports, compilations and manuals is done for wider dissemination. During the year (up to 31st March, 2022) 08 research studies/documentations have been completed



2.5 Field Demonstration & Counselling Services

The Institute runs Field Demonstration Services at its Headquarters and Regional Centres and also brings out various publications in areas of its interest. The Child Guidance Centre at NIPCCD continues to provide quality services with the mission of restoring emotional wellbeing of children and families. During the year, 2021-22, 335 new cases were registered at the Centre and additionally 2690 children maintained follow-up for various interventions. A total of 3204 online consultations were held for children and parents.

The Adolescent Guidance Service Centre (AGSC) works with the vision of promoting positive mental health of adolescents. Through a comprehensive adolescent guidance programme, which incorporates counselling and supportive intervention, the Centre aims to promote healthy psychosocial development of young people in the age range of 12-19 years. During the year 2021-22, there were 33 new cases of adolescents who were enrolled with AGSC. Nearly 250 follow-up cases were also counselled and over 457 consultations were provided for various assessments and therapies during the year.

2.6 Liaisoning with Research Institutions, Universities and other bodies during the year 2021-22

NIPCCD collaborated with various institutions on variegated projects during 2021-22. National Institutes of repute like the National Institute of Nutrition (NIN), National Institute of Mental Health and Neuro Sciences (NIMHANS), National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT), National Institute of Disaster Management, etc., joined hands with NIPCCD for various projects.

NIPCCD has always been instrumental in

providing technical service facilities to the government in the formulation and implementation of programmes related to women and child development. Senior Officials of NIPCCD prepared a background note on 'Impact of COVID on Learning Outcome for Children' in December, 2021. Also, a Meeting was organized for Onboarding UNNATI scholarship scheme on the portal for wider dissemination and utilisation of the scheme. Senior Officials of NIPCCD acted as members of Group of Experts, National Curriculum Framework for School Education and National Curriculum Framework for Early Childhood Care & Education under the Ministry of School Education for rolling out of ECCE in the country.

The Faculty also interacted with Ministries, Directorates and State Departments from NIPCCD Headquarters and it's Regional Centres on various pertinent issues of Women & Child Development & Empowerment issues in a collaborative manner. For instance, a meeting was held under the chairmanship of Chief Secretary, Women & Child Development, Empowerment of Differently-Abled and Senior Citizens Department, Government of Karnataka regarding the Annual Programme Plan Implementation (APIP) on 16th September, 2021 wherein faculty members of Regional Centre, Bengaluru, were invited for expert opinion.

Faculty members having specialization in various subjects in relation to women and child development were invited as resource persons/subject matter specialists from Headquarters as well as Regional Centres by renowned Schools, Colleges & Universities.

2.7 Internship to Research Students

NIPCCD has been providing Internship to Research Students on all key thematic areas in the field of Women & Child and Gender issues



through its Internship Programmes as well as Field Placements at Headquarters and Regional Centres. In the year 2021-22, the Institute provided Internship to 30 Research Students pursuing Research Projects in Universities/Colleges.

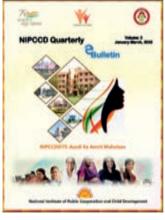
2.8 NEW INITIATIVES OF NIPCCD

2.8.1 NIPCCD Quarterly e-Bulletin

The Anganwadi Services Scheme under the Umbrella ICDS has evolved with differential approaches across the States and there are many examples of innovative and successful models implemented by the State Governments that have reaped good results and have potentials of being scaled up even further. Also, Child Care Institutions across the states have also developed and adopted various best practices for the well-being and rehabilitation of children (Children in Conflict with Law & Children in Need of Care and Protection), keeping in mind the best interests of the child and also to abide by the process given in the JJ Act 2015.

NIPCCD in the year 2021-22 has published its quarterly **e-Bulletin** with a collection of best practices from the States across India; and highlights of activities of NIPCCD showcasing the broad vision of the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India.





2.8.2 Expectations from the States with regard to Work Plan of NIPCCD

An Online Meeting with Principal State Secretaries was organized on 11th February, 2022 to discuss expectations from NIPCCD from the States. NIPCCD through its enriching activities is gearing up for implementation of its "Work Plan 2022-23". In order to address gaps in State action for women and children, an Online Meeting with Principal State Secretaries, Directors and State Officials of the Department of Women and Child Development was organized on 11th February, 2022 under the Chairmanship of Shri Indevar Pandey, Secretary, MWCD.



The main objective of this meeting was to discuss and know about the expectations of States from NIPCCD. A total of 34 States/UTs participated and suggestions received from the States are being incorporated in the NIPCCD Work Plan 2022-23. Honorable Secretary, MWCD, apprised one and all that the capacity building of various stakeholders including those of CDPOs, AWWs, etc., was the need of the hour wherein NIPCCD could play a crucial role in rolling out the schemes of MWCD.

Few salient suggestions included conducting regular Refresher Courses for functionaries of AWS Scheme, Training on best practices of states and NIPCCD to develop training modules of Poshan Abhiyaan and Poshan Tracker. The states



in the North-Eastern highlighted the problems of substance abuse among adolescents and emphasized the need for training on mental health issues. With regard to Child Protection issues, states requested NIPCCD to undertake training at all levels including CWC, DCPU, and JJ Act, etc., including Counselling with SAMVAD & NIMHANS.

2.8.3 NIPCCD-BPR&D Collaboration for Self-Defence Training of Women

On the eve of International Women's Week Day Celebrations, on 1st March, 2022 at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi, special interactive sessions were held by BPR&D and NIPCCD Officials on safety and security of women. The major objectives of the training programmes were to empower adolescent girls and women by: making them aware about sensing attack and danger and apply presence of mind and measures to avert the impending danger; equipping them with self defence skills so that they can avert any kind of physical assault/ untoward situation at least at the first instances; building their self-confidence so that they can contribute meaningfully to their own development, shape their own destiny and capacity enhancement through self defence training; and spreading a message to the violencemaker that girls and women are ready for counterdefence and awareness is being developed in this regard.

2.9 SPECIALACHIEVEMENTS

2.9.1 NIPCCD celebrating "Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav": Children Ideas, Rights & Nutrition (14-21 November, 2021)

MWCD celebrated Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav (14-21 November, 2021) with the theme of 'Children Ideas, Rights & Nutrition'. The objective is to generate awareness about child rights and stimulate the collective thought process of the community at large in this direction mainly through

outreach activities in Child Care Institutions (CCIs) and Specialized Adoption Agencies.



During this week, visits were made by NIPCCD Officials to 17 Child Care Institutions including Government Observation Homes, Children Home for Special Needs and Specialized Adoption Agencies spread across 16 States/UTs (Delhi, Chandigarh, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Rajasthan, Haryana, Karnataka, Himachal Pradesh, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, Assam, Madhya Pradesh, Delhi, Meghalaya and Manipur) by MWCD officials and organised various activities for children in collaboration with Ministry of Culture and Ministry of Environment.



The complete package of events over the week were a source of inspiration to make children aware of their own creativity with new and innovative ideas making them self-reliant.



NIPCCD also developed an interactive Child Rights Awareness Booklet for children living in CCIs on the occasion of AKAM celebrated by the Institute in November 2021. NIPCCD prepared an **e-book** for MWCD on celebrating Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav (14th-21st November, 2021) with the theme: Children Ideas, Rights & Nutrition and the same has been published on Ministry of Culture Website Website (https://amritmahotsav.nic.in/children-cornerdetail.htm?11)

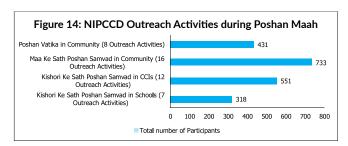
2.9.2 Breast Feeding Week (1st-7th August, 2021) was celebrated at NIPCCD Headquarters and its Regional Centres and the importance of IYCF practices was highlighted through various training programmes. In Regional Centre, Guwahati, women connected from remote villages of Assam to the Webinar on "Protected Breast Feeding" organised on 2nd August, 2021.

2.9.3 Celebration of Rashtriya Poshan Maah, 1st-30th September, 2021 (Outreach Activities on Nutrition Issues in Schools, CCIs and Community by NIPCCD)

NIPCCD, New Delhi and its five Regional Centres celebrated Rashrtiya Poshan Maah and carried out outreach activities as per a plan approved by MWCD. The idea behind the celebration was to reach out to adolescent girls in schools, CCIs and the community, and mothers (including pregnant and lactating women) through direct dialogues on "Nutrition Issues".



The outreach activities included height and weight monitoring, counselling, quiz & poster making competition, reciting Poshan Anthem, Poshan Shapath, discussion on "My Thali", Hum Se Suno (Extempore speech from community members), Poshan Rally, hand washing techniques, focus group discussions for mothers on infant and young child nutrition, food pyramid chart, indigenous nutritious recipes and Poshan Vatika, etc.



2.9.4 Rashtriya Poshan Maah at Regional Centre, Guwahati

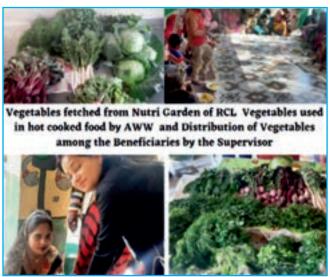
At Regional Centre, Guwahati, Poshan Maah was celebrated wherein Awareness Campaign, Poshan Rally & Poshan Vatika were organized to sensitize Pregnant & Lactating Women and Children on the Importance of Nutrition. Demonstration on assessing nutritional status along with recipe demonstration were the key highlights of the programme.





2.9.5 Glimpses of distribution of vegetables of Nutrigarden in AWC, Mishrpur, Bakshi Ka Talab ICDS Project, Lucknow

A Nutrigarden/ Poshan Vatika has been developed in NIPCCD Regional Centre (Lucknow) with the idea of enhancing the awareness regarding organic vegetables, which has been further propagated in nearby Anganwadi Centers. Keeping this in mind to improve the nutrition and health of children and pregnant and lactating mothers, the vegetables grown are being distributed in the communities/ Institutions.



2.9.6 Special Campaign (02nd October, 2021 to 31st October, 2021)

In accordance with the directions of Cabinet Secretariat and MWCD, a Special Campaign was undertaken by NIPCCD from 02nd October, 2021 to 31st October, 2021. Some of the major achievements included review of 7044 physical files and weeding out of 494 files, old scrap material generating revenue and freeing out space at the Institute.

2.9.7 Celebration of Swachhata Pakhwada, 1st-15th March, 2022

Various activities were organized by the students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling (ADCGC) during the Swachhata Pakhwada. Decorating the Bulletin Board, Poster-Making, Exhibition of Recycled Material, Nukkad Natak (named "Bhumitra Sena"), etc.,

were some of the activities organized during the period. Swachhata Pakhwada was celebrated across all regional centres. In Regional Centre, Guwahati adolescents of CCIs were mobilized and sensitized on Swachhata. Swachhata Kiosk was organized at Beltola Bazaar on 15th March, 2022 at Guwahati which was appreciated by one and all.

2.9.8 "Hindi Pakhwada" was organized from 14th to 30th September, 2021

Many competitions like 'Hindi Lekhan' and 'Hindi Anuwad Gyan' essay writing and quiz competitions were organized, during this period. In addition, 'Hindi Workshops were also organized for the staff and faculty of the Institute to motivate and bring about a positive perception about the language Hindi and to promote Hindi as the official language of India. During the year 2021-22, efforts were made by the Hindi Section at the NIPCCD Headquarters and the Regional Centres to implement Hindi as Official language by organizing Hindi Meetings and Hindi Workshops as per Section 3 (3) of The Official Languages Act 1963.

2.9.9 During the year 2020-21, Regional Centre, Bengaluru was awarded First prize by Town Official Language Implementation Committee (02), Bengaluru, on 17th March, 2021 for its appreciable contribution in implementation of Hindi Language at Regional Centre (Bengaluru).

2.9.10 A Virtual Hindi Workshop on "राजभाषा नीति एपं डिजिटल भारत" was held on 30th March, 2022 by Regional Centre, Guhawati. Deliberations were held from Officials of NE Regional Implementation Office, Department of Official Language, Ministry of HRD, Gol, Guwahati.

2.10 Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance & Counselling (ADCGC)

The Institute runs a full-time One-Year Diploma Course namely Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling in affiliation with Sri Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University and recognized by Rehabilitation Council of India. Presently, XVII Batch of ADCGC is running with with an enrollment of 32 students holding a post graduate degree in social work/physiology and child development. The Regional Centre, Guwahati inaugurated the One Year Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling on October 20, 2021 in order cater to the Northeastern Region of India. The diploma is affiliated to Gauhati University.

2.11 Management of funds for execution of the "PM CARES for Children Scheme" by NIPCCD

It has always been truly inspiring and heart-warming for the Institute for receiving incessant support from MWCD for execution of its curricula and various other activities. The Institute is strengthening its accounts-related practices through various measures. In the year 2021, NIPCCD has been extended the responsibility of management of funds for execution of the "PM CARES for Children Scheme" at the behest of MWCD.

3.1.1 CARE OF NEW-BORN & INFANT AND YOUNG CHILD NUTRITION (IYCN)

An Online Training on Care of New-born & Infant and Young Child Nutrition (IYCN) was organised on 9-11 August, 2021 by NIPCCD, Headquarters with the objectives to: enrich the technical knowledge on Infant and Young Child Nutrition; build counselling skills on exclusive breastfeeding and complementary feeding; and learn growth monitoring and measuring & feeding during emergencies including HIV & COVID-19. A total of 46 Participants attended the training.

An Online Training Programme on IYCF for Functionaries of Tribal Anganwadi Services Projects under Umbrella ICDS was organised on 31 August - 03 September, 2021 by Regional Centre, Indore with the main objectives to: enhance the technical knowledge on Infant and Young Child Feeding; build counseling skills on exclusive breastfeeding and complementary feeding; orient participants on growth monitoring of children; and practice IYCF counseling with emphasis on correct positioning, helping mothers to breastfeed through clinical practice. A total of 32 functionaries of Tribal Anganwadi Services Projects participated in the programme.

An Online Orientation Training on Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) for Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS was organised on 22-24 November, 2021 by NIPCCD, Headquarters with the main objectives to: enhance the technical knowledge on Infant and Young Child Feeding; build counselling skills on exclusive breastfeeding and complementary feeding; learn growth monitoring, use of Mother & Child Protection (MCP) Card; and develop understanding on feeding of young sick child during emergencies including HIV &COVID-19. A total of 43 participants attended the training.

A total of two Online Orientation Programmes on Empowering Families for ensuring Optimal IYCF practices during COVID-19 Pandemic for the Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme were organised with the objectives to: create awareness about the problems and challenges faced by children in order to enhance the technical knowledge on optimal Infant and Young Child Feeding in the context of COVID-19 pandemic; build counseling skills in IYCF counseling with emphasis on exclusive breastfeeding and complementary feeding in the context of COVID pandemic; and enhance the knowledge about helping families to sustain IYCF practices affected by COVID-19.

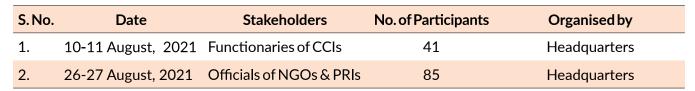

A total of 79 participants attended the programme.

Research Methodology and Statistical Analysis

An Online Orientation Programme on Research Methodology and Statistical Analysis in Social Sciences was organised from 1-3 December, 2021 by Regional Centre, Indore with the main objectives to: orient participants on latest trends in use of research methodology and statistical analysis in social science; enhance their knowledge and skill on different components of research methodology; and sharpen their understanding on appropriate use of statistical tools and techniques. A total of 20 parents and teachers participated in the programme.

4. COMPLETED RESEARCH/DOCUMENTATION PROJECTS

4.1 RESEARCH / EVALUATION STUDIES

4.1.1 An Action Project to Support Children's Home, Fatasil, Ambari, Guwahati

The ability to engage the young male to gain knowledge and skills to address their concerns specially relating to puberty and sexuality, substance use, violence, risk-taking behaviours, mental health, etc, is very critical, more so for children in an institutional set-up. It is important to take every opportunity with adolescent boys to talk about issues beyond the presenting complain and let them know about confidential care. Keeping the above in view, an Action Project was initiated at Fatasil Children's Home using eleven Arts Based Creative Workshops, viz, painting, clay work, drawing, theatre, storytelling, drama, games, etc, to help the child explore his inner world and empower him with life skills with the objectives to: address behavioural problems of children in Fatasil Home and contribute to the holistic development of children in Fatasil Home. It was an attempt to develop on understanding among inmates of the children's Home to work towards their emotional and cognitive balance and acquaint them with appropriate self-care skills to deal with their adolescent issues. These workshops were conducted around themes of Emotional Wellbeing, Self-Esteem, Assertiveness, Self-Control, Leadership, etc, Psychological assessment of each child was done apart from facilitating art-based sessions and sessions on individual and group counselling were also conducted.

4.1.2 A Review of Time - Motion and Monitoring Mechanisms of ICDS in Southern States

In order to review the monitoring process, guidelines, tools and indicators used in Database / profile of ICDS Project to facilitate better implementation and monitoring outcomes the Institute conducted a study on "Review of Time-Motion and Monitoring Mechanisms of ICDS in Southern States". The study covered five southern states, namely Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, and Telangana as a universe. The main

objectives of the study were to: review the annual time-task analysis of AWWs, Supervisors and CDPOs; study the monitoring and supervision process of Supervisors and CDPOs, and record the views of AWWs on contribution of such monitoring visits; analyse the adequacy of database available with CDPOs and Supervisors on various aspects, required for comprehensive understanding of their Projects; document monitoring initiatives/mechanisms at State level; and identify the gaps and strengths in monitoring and supervision and suggest action points for effective implementation of the scheme.

4.1.3 Status of Appraisal of Swadhar Scheme in Uttar Pradesh

The Swadhar Greh Scheme of Ministry of Women and Child Development targets women victims in difficult circumstances who need institutional support for rehabilitation so that they could lead their life with dignity. The scheme envisages providing shelter, food, clothing and health as well as economic and social security through vocational & skill upgradation training for economic rehabilitation of such women, counselling, awareness generation, behavioral modification, Legal aid and Guidance. NGOs are the pioneer and key organizations for implementing the Swadhar Greh Scheme. In order to understand its implementation and infrastructural facilities available with the agencies for effective organization of services to beneficiaries, the Institute proposed to conduct status apprisal study of the scheme in the state of Uttar Pradesh. The main objectives of the study were to: study in detail the background of the beneficiaries who took shelter in the Swadhar and Alp Awas Greh; study the services rendered to beneficiaries in these homes and their adequacy; study and understand the problems being experienced by the beneficiaries in their rehabilitation and restoration to their families; study the role of counsellors and their contribution to providing support to the inmates of Swadhar and Alp Awas Greh; study and understand the views and experiences of the head or incharge of organisations running the Swadhar and Alp Awas Greh; and suggest measures to improve the functioning of Swadhar and Alp Awas Greh.



4.2 DOCUMENTATION: HANDBOOK/ GUIDEBOOK

4.2.1 Handbook: Safety and Security of Women at Public Places

An environment free of violence or threat to violence is a right of every girl and woman of the country and ensuring the same is the responsibility of the State and every citizen. It requires a comprehensive and coordinated approach and involvement of all the stakeholders including women themselves. It was realized that there is need for creating awareness and enhancing the knowledge, skills and confidence of women. It is important to provide women with information and strategies that can help them in dealing with the various threats they face in their day to day life. The Handbook is an attempt to create awareness by bringing together relevant information and measures as a ready reference for women to combat violence/ threat of violence against them in public places. It is a reference book containing vital information in single publication on safety and security measures for women in public places. The objectives of Handbook are to: serve as a tool to build capacity of women for prevention of abuse; enhance knowledge on the existing Government and Non-Government supportive framework for safety of women; and enable women to deal with abuse/violence through skilling and updation of self defence techniques.

4.2.2 Child Mental Health: Handbook on Child Mental Health for School Teachers and Parents

Good mental health allows to think clearly, develop socially and learn new skills. It is important to recognize and treat mental difficulties in children early on. Once mental difficulty develops, it becomes a regular part of child's behaviour and is more difficult to treat. It is easy for parents to identify their child's physical needs. However, a child's mental and emotional needs may not be as obvious. Also, teachers have powerful influence on children's lives and they may be among the first people to notice changes in a child's mental health. It makes important to disseminate the information on this issue in simpler form which can be easily

understood by teachers and parents. This may result in building motivation among teachers and parents to connect the children to the mental health services at the right time. It was felt that the compilation of the information in the form of Handbook may prove beneficial in helping parents and teachers to identify the mental health difficulties in children, the immediate steps parents and teachers can take for helping them, and provide the information on finding resources for the long term intervention etc. The Handbook will present, a comprehensive overview which may be an essential reference resource for all those teachers and parents involved or interested in child mental health. The main objectives of the Handbook are to: develop a handbook on child mental health which will highlight the importance of child mental health; illustrate the signs and symptoms of various mental health problems observed in the children; provide guidelines to the parents and teachers on effective management of mental health to create positive school climate and supportive home environment.

4.2.3 Documentation on Resource Directory of Southern States for Children in Need of Care and Protection and Children in Conflict with Law

The Government of India has launched Integrated Child Protection Scheme in 2009 for the care, protection, treatment and rehabilitation of children/ Juvenile. The stakeholders of ICPS includes Magistrates/Members of Juvenile justice boards (JJBs), Members/Chairpersons of Child Welfare Committees (CWCs), Police of Special Juvenile Police Units (SJPUs), functionaries of SCPS/DCPS, Child Care Institutions, etc. Under the scheme, District Child Protection Unit has been constituted in all the districts of the country to ensure effective implementation of ICPS in coordination and networking with different stakeholders/departments under the administration of District Magistrate as the overall in-charge of unit. One of the responsibilities of the DCPU is to develop resource directory of child-related services at the district level. In view of this, it was fect document a resource directory for different stakeholders of southern States for strengthening intervention and rehabilitation of children in need of care and protection and children



in conflict with law. The said Resource Directory is the compilation of service providers in Child Care Institutions of Southern States of India. Resource Directory can be used to help primary care to service providers and other stakeholders of ICPS to identify resources and services of CCIs for rehabilitation of children in the institutions. This resource guide was designed to assist and empower stakeholders of ICPS in their journey of researching optimal services for the children of CCIs by providing information on local resources. The objectives of the resource directory are to: compile data from DCPUs for documenting resource directory of southern states relevant to service providers to the CCIs related to health, education, food, transport, clothing, counselling, shelter, sponsorship, coaching, etc.; and disseminate the resource directory among State Government for the use of stakeholders of child rights and protection.

4.4.4 Comprehensive Guidebook for Functionaries of Specialized Adoption Agency on Nutrition and Health Care of Children

Children have the right to grow up in an environment in which they are enabled to reach their full potential in life. The health outcomes of a child are directly proportional to their nutrition and Health care practices, which are, in turn, dependent on the knowledge and practices of the caregiver. Many of these children are not fortunate enough to get proper parental care. Some are either surrendered/ abandoned by their own parents and under the circumstances these children are left in the care of special adoption agencies and many of these children suffer from illnesses due to inadequate nutrition and health care practices. Specialized Adoption Agencies are the prime Institutions for taking care of Orphan, Abundant and Surrendered children below the age of six years and responsible for providing optimum care and development of children. It has been observed that the functionaries working in SAA homes have scarce knowledge and skills for giving adequate nutrition and Health care of children. Further, it is clearly mentioned in the standard operating procedure (SOP) of Specialized Adoption Agencies that adequate nutrition and health care of children for achieving milestones of development of children and this could be done only if the caregiver has sufficient knowledge and skills. Keeping this is in view, the Institute has developed a comprehensive guidebook on Nutrition and Health Care of Children for SAA functionaries with the objectives to: provide requisite information on nutrition and health care of children strengthening their knowledge and skills of caregivers; and apprise the functionaries with the age appropriate nutrition and health care needs of Children (0-6 Years).

4.4.5 Compendium of Office Orders, Circulars/ Guidelines of the Schemes being Implemented under Umbrella ICDS in Southern States

The present documentation will give the understanding of implementation of Schemes under umbrella ICDS in the southern region on various aspects by going through the kind of circulars/orders/guidelines issued by the concerned nodal Departments of each State. Therefore, the need to compile the guidelines/orders/circulars issued by the concerned State Governments of Southern region as it generates the basic idea and framework on the implementation processes/ activities/services rendered under Umbrella ICDS while consistently being engaged in path creation and moving in the direction of desired outcomes. Primarily, this understanding provides the basis to think, plan and connect in a meaningful way by designing relevant and appropriate training content and consequently adding strength to push the efforts made by the concerned Departments of the States towards sustainable goals. Secondly, it serves as a reference document for trainees particularly CDPOs and other functionaries of Child Protection Scheme working Schemes under Umbrella ICDS of different States of South India enabling exchange of knowledge and thereby paving way for replication and innovation in fulfilling the very purpose.

Field Demonstration Services

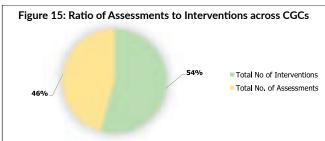
The Institute runs Field Demonstration Services for Mental Health Counselling of Children at its Headquarters and Regional Centres and also brings out various publications in areas of its interest.

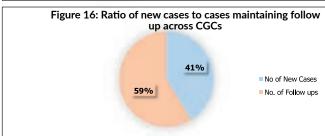
5.1 Child Guidance Centre (CGC)

The Child Guidance Centers at NIPCCD have been serving the community for over three decades along with providing direct diagnostic counselling, therapeutic and referral services to children with learning, behavior and developmental problems. CGCs follow a Bio-Psycho-social model of assessment and Interventions. The services are rendered through part time clinics which are run through trained and certified multi-disciplinary team of professionals. Each CGC has crafted its processes and team in line with the regional realities and needs. It is also conducting advocacy and community education activities to promote the cause of wellbeing and mental health of children through workshops for teachers, parents and adolescents in the community.

During the year (2021-22) the CGCs across the Regional Centers and the Headquarters served 458 new registrants who could reach out to the Centers during the second wave of the pandemic. These centres made available their services in a hybrid mode. The Centers created a combination of online and in-person assessment and intervention services. In addition to the new registrants, the Centers also continued to reach out to 644 other children for different intervention services. During the second wave of the Pandemic, the school and intervention Centers were relatively more available to children. Nonetheless, the problems had also aggravated and parents were seeking out more individualized support from the counseling Centers of NIPCCD. Thus, unlike a usual year wherein assessments take over more clinical time and space of Centers, the clinical services

were re-aligned to provide nearly equal time and space for assessments and interventions so that the community could be better supported.



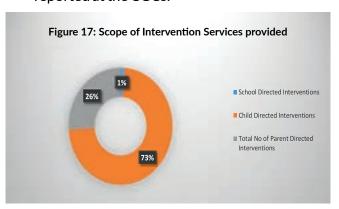


Thus, the Centers spent a proportion of their intervention time in providing various child directed interventions such as: Supportive Educational Interventions (Remedial Education/ Special Education) Speech and Language therapy, Occupational Therapy Physiotherapy Career Counselling Supportive Emotional Counselling Play therapy/Art-Based Therapy Cognitive Behavior Therapy. These contributed to almost 73% of all interventions. Furthermore, another 26% of interventions were parent- directed. The aim of these interventions were to empower parents through Parent Counseling, Supportive emotional Counseling to parents to handle life stressors, parent training in positive parenting, simple home-based stimulation that they could undertake with children, and basic psycho-social education on understanding difficult behaviors and simple ways of managing them. Regional Centre, Mohali also reached out by providing small proportion of school directed interventions wherein schools were given IEPs and simple classroom management strategies to facilitate children. The exact nature of intervention services varied across the Centers as per the team of professionals available in the Centre and nature

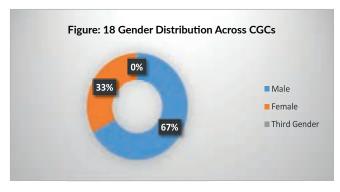


of conditions reported at the respective counseling centers. Nonetheless, each intervention was highly customized and individualized to the needs of the child and the family. In addition a very small percentage of interventions (3%) included medicinal interventions through a psychiatrist or pediatrician that were available in two of the six counseling centers of the Institute such as; Delhi and Guwahati. Similarly, a small percentage of children were also supported through career guidance and counseling at Adolescent Guidance Centre, Delhi and CGC, Mohali.

All the counseling centers have an open door policy wherein children with any difficulty/ disability/disorder can access services, yet the, nature of conditions reported at each of the centers are very typical to them. Thus, across the centers, the conditions reported ranged from Learning problems (23%) including Specific Learning Disabilities (13%) followed by Autism Spectrum Disorder (22%), Global Developmental Disorders (14%), and ADHD (7%). Furthermore, about 10% of the conditions reported at the counseling centers also comprised socio-emotional difficulties which were manifesting as externalized, internalized, and stigmatized behaviors. Of these only 2% had defined disorders such as ODD or conduct. The remaining had underlying socio-emotional distress coming from situational and environmental factors. Though in small number, even conditions such as Intellectual Disability, Borderline Intelligence, Speech Difficulties and Epilepsy were also reported at the CGCs.



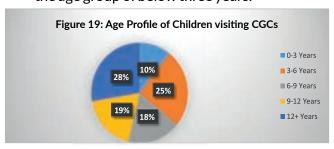
The profile of the referral bodies indicates that nearly 43 percent of referrals were made by schools and special schools in the respective cities, followed by (23 percent) medical professionals and earlier clients (21 percent) another six percent were also referred by other mental health professionals. The children attending the CGCs were largely school-going population; only 10 percent of children below 3 years were reported for developmental concerns to these CGCs. The nature of disorders reported in the clinic were largely incidental in nature but it seems that somehow the nature of disorders reported correlated with the referral bodies. Since the referral was highest from Schools and Special Schools, highest percentages of learning problems were reported. This was followed by hospitals and private practitioners as the second highest referral body which would have resulted in reporting of Autism Spectrum Disorder as the second highest reported condition.



- Furthermore, in the context of gender differentials, more percentage of males were a part of the incidental sample than the females. Regional Centre, Mohali has reported, though a small number, but the third gender also approaching to access services.
- In regard to the age profile of children visiting CGCs, a maximum of 28 percent is from the age group above 12 years, followed by 25 percent in the age group of 3 to 6 years. It may be because the major referral source for CGC is from schools and medical health professionals.
- Further, from the age group of 9 to 12 years, 19 percent of children and from 6-9 years, 18



percent of them were referred respectively. A small 10 percent of children are referred from the age group of below three years.



5.2 Outreach work

Promoting emotional wellbeing of children is possible by advocating the cause of children and educating the major stakeholders safe guarding and nurturing the children such as parents and schools. The Centers regularly conduct workshops for parents and teachers on several mental health concerns. During the second wave of pandemic, these workshops were given precedence over clinical activities to address community needs.

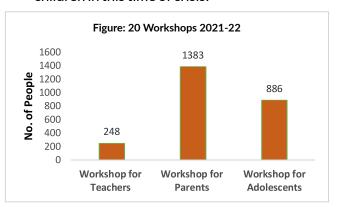
5.3 Major Themes of Parent Workshops



 Similarly adolescents too were manifesting several concerns regarding their future. So, workshops were conducted for adolescents on themes like – Time management, Self-Care, Interpersonal Relationships, Managing Stress etc. Hence, Centers reached out to around 480 children.

5.4 Workshop for Parents & Teachers

 COVID-19 also brought new stressors on teachers, parents, and caregivers. This has hampered their capacity to provide care and remain engaged with their children. Being very keen observers of people and environments, children noticed, absorbed, and reacted to the stress in their caregivers and community members, which unavoidably affected their well-being. For most children, there was a major change in the pattern of their lives. While adjusting to the new demands of the pandemic, most children were in a state of disequilibrium. The unique nature of the pandemic placed parents and teachers as the first-line responders for children's survival, care, and learning. Therefore, efforts to reach children's needs were made by reaching parents and teachers with support, encouragement, and practical, actionable ideas to support their children in this time of crisis.



Therefore, the Child Guidance Centre across the country along with the clinical work was also engaged in outreach activities which included supporting the parents, teachers, and adolescents through workshops, career talks, on-site interventions for children and caregivers of CCIs, etc. The earlier a child is able to have/get access mental health care, the more effective it can be. Early treatment can help the child in school and on track to achieving their life goals. When children get the right care at the right time, we can prevent negative outcomes like school failure, and other mental health issues. For children to get early mental health care, it is necessary that teachers and parents are aware of mental health issues in children so that they can seek help at an early stage. Hence, conducting workshops on mental health issues of children for teachers and parents was essential. A total of nine teacher workshops and 19 parent workshops were organized during the year, thus reaching out to 1631 caregivers. The important objectives of the teachers and

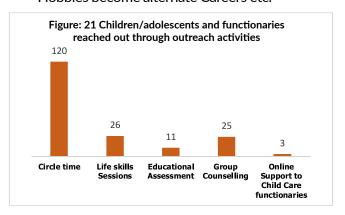


parental workshops were to make them understand the importance of mental wellbeing for school children; make them aware of mental health warning signs and ways to address them early and to educate them to support children's mental health and wellbeing. The main themes included Psychosocial concerns related to children & Demystifying the Process of Assessment, effective parenting, nutritional and psychological care of children during the COVID-19 Pandemic, handling stress and anxiety of children in the new normal, social media addiction among children, home-based interventions for parents of children with special needs, screen time management, the importance of intensive speech stimulation for child development, making school a joyful and conducive place for children, etc.

5.5 Workshop for Adolescents

The need for concerted efforts to ensure safe return of adolescents to school and provide quality learning in a conducive environment was paramount Adolescents require special attention and there was a need to promote healthy lifestyle among them. Keeping in mind the fact that it is important to keep adolescents not only physically safe, but also look after their psychological and emotional well-being, the importance of conducting life skills workshops with adolescents was established. The life skills sessions were formulated and conducted in various schools focusing upon various themes based on the needs assessment of the adolescents. The adolescents reported physical and mental exhaustion due to increased screen time and feeling a sense of disconnect in their interpersonal relationship. Aggravated feelings of discouragement along with being anxious due to the constant uncertainty, provoked fear among them. Besides this, the lack of coping skills to explore different channels of energy was leading to difficulties in keeping up with the pace and demand of online classes. Thus, the broad objective of the workshops was to enhance the knowledge and abilities of adolescents for developing an internal locus of control and enhanced mental and physical wellbeing. Development of effective coping skills, formulating ways to socially connect and focus on a healthy lifestyle along with making adolescents aware and equipping them with necessary skills to make healthier choices in life to enhance the quality of life was also focused upon. Therefore, 301 adolescents were trained on Life skill education.

Along with life skills sessions, careers talks were also conducted with schools and about 400 adolescents were reached out. The aim was to make them aware of the wide variety of career choices available to them. The sessions encouraged the adolescents to perceive the new emerging trends in the career field. The career guidance worked at providing adolescents with the opportunities to build their general capabilities, support their interests and aspirations, and helped them to make informed decisions about their subject choices and pathways. Career talks gave them an awareness to identify their skills, values, aptitude and personalities, which is fundamental for career growth. Career Talks were conducted on topics such as Career in Food and Technology, Career opportunities in Physical Education, Career in Event Management, Diploma Courses after Class-X, Hospitality and Tourism, Diploma Course in Science and Art, Fashion Designing, Course v/s College Dilemma and can interest and Hobbies become alternate Careers etc.



5.6 Activities in Child Care Institutions

 The professionals of the Child Guidance Centre, Lucknow visited Rajkiya Bal Grah (Baalika), Moti Nagar and successfully carried out supportive mental health activities with the children and adolescents along with



educational assessment. These primarily included conducting Life Skills Education and Supportive Counselling for children and adolescents. Further, the team continued offering their support to the functionaries of Child Care Institutions in addressing any identified behavioural or emotional problems of children and adolescents in an online mode.

The outreach activities included conducting Quality Circle Time sessions in age-appropriate groups (young children ranging from 10-13 in one group and adolescents ranging from 13-16 in groups of two) focusing on enhancing socioemotional competence as well as interpersonal relationship amongst children. The activities also included Life-skill sessions with 26 children to enhance their emotional literacy and self-awareness through movie screening and simulations helping them to reflect on the social and emotional aspects of the movie and consider how their own emotions work. In the context of educational assessment, to first identify the respective gaps as well as their current level of functioning, educational assessments were carried out with 11schoolgoing children. Group counseling sessions were conducted for 25 school-going children exploring their academic concerns or other challenges faced by them in school. Follow-up online support services were provided to the functionaries of Child Care Institutions regarding any identified behavioural or emotional issues of the children and further psycho-educated them on the benefits of Quality circle time which can be conducted at any point of the day as a means to encourage the development of self-discipline and conflict resolution as well as to foster mutual acceptance amongst children. The importance of continuing to provide the children with a consistent routine for structured activities as well as free time for play was also deliberated.

5.7 Internships at CGC

 Another form of outreach activity of Child Guidance Centres (CGC) & Adolescent Guidance and Service Centre (AGSC) in the Headquaters as well as in all its Regional Centres

was through its internship programmes and placements mentoring aspiring students from various disciplines of social sciences. The CGC & AGSC offers its platform to the students to gain experiences and exposure to hone their skills and to shape their passion towards the world of Mental Health. They have been provided exposure and mentoring through case discussions, clinical case observations, observations of career counseling, scoring and interpretation, and exposure to clinical case report writing. The knowledge and skill acquired by the professional of CGC through its experiences of working with children with various disabilities, disorders, and difficulties are disseminated to these budding aspirants through the internship placements and equip them to work in the field of Mental Health.

• The CGC & AGSC during the year 2021-22 has provided internship opportunities to 65 students and trainee counselors of various institutions including Lady Irwin College, University of Delhi; Jamia Millia Islamia University, Sri Guru Tegh Bahadur University (SGT, Gurgaon), Panjab University, Indraprastha College, Delhi University, Kurukshetra University, Haryana; Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar, Punjab; Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla; Lucknow University, Dibrugarh University, Assam; Rajiv Gandhi University Arunachal Pradesh; Royal Global University Assam, University of Science and Technology Meghalaya and Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling, respectively.

5.8 Adolescent Guidance Service Centre (AGSC)

The Adolescent Guidance Service Centre (AGSC) works with the vision of promoting positive mental health of adolescents. Through a comprehensive adolescent guidance programme, which incorporates counselling and supportive intervention, the Centre aims to promote healthy psychosocial development of young people in the age range of 12-19 years. During the year 2021-22 there were 33 new cases of adolescents who were enrolled with AGSC. Nearly 250 follow-up cases were also counselled and over 457 consultations were provided for various assessments and therapies during the year.

- 6. Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance & Counselling (ADCGC)
- 6.1 ADCGC at NIPCCD, New Delhi, in affiliation with Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi

The Institute launched the Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling in the year 2005 to address the need for trained manpower to work in the area of child and adolescent mental health. The course is under affiliation with Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi, and is also recognized from the Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI). So far, the Institute has organized 16 batches of the course. The Advanced Diploma has been designed to bridge the gap of availability of trained professionals for undertaking counselling and guidance of children and families in different settings. It has been planned with a Developmental, Ecological and Rights Perspective to enable the learner to function effectively as a mental health professional with an updated understanding of theoretical constructs, and the requisite skills. The inherent emphasis of the programme is on 'Development of Self' and 'Acquisition of Skills' through experiential and action learning.

The course envisions to create professional and personal growth opportunities for those working with children and child-related systems so as to enable children to actualize their potential.

Presently, the Seventeenth Batch (XVII) of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling is running with an enrolment of 31 students holding a Postgraduate Degree in Social Work/ Psychology/ Child Development. In addition to regular 28 students, three students from EWS category also availed admission as per Govt. directives in the current batch. Academic Session and End-term examination has been completed for the year 2021-22. Internship for the students is scheduled to be completed in December 2022. As per the current guidelines of GGSIPU, the course was primarily being transacted in the online mode. Thus, to compensate the lack of direct experiential work in schools and clinics, special efforts were made to make the classes experiential by giving practice work or pre-session activities so that they are able to-bring experiences to the classroom for discussion and reflections.

6.2 ADCGC at Regional Centre, Guwahati in affiliation with Gauhati University

The Regional Centre, Guwahati inaugurated the One Year Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling on October 20, 2021. The course is initiated with the objective to cater to the need for trained mental health professionals and counsellors in the Northeastern Region of India. The Diploma is affiliated to Gauhati University. The total students' capacity is 20. A total of 16 students are presently pursuing the Diploma course.

8. Library & Documentation Centre on Women and Children (DCWC)

8.1 Library: The Institute has a full-fledged Library with collection of books on various issues related to Women and Children. The library has a dedicated section for reference books. The Institute also subscribes to various International and National Journals and provides a comfortable reading room to readers wherein scholars, academicians, interns and students from other Universities also come to do reference work. The wide collection of books cater to the academic needs of students from many specializations like social work, psychology, women studies, gender studies, public health and nutrition, etc.

Online subscription: This year a new initiative was taken by the Institute to subscribe to online books. The Institute subscribed to Pearson Online Library for the faculty as well students of Advanced Diploma at New Delhi and Guwahati. These online books provided easy access to readers related to various subjects pertaining to the work of the Institute. The access to all these books selected by the faculty from all Regional Centres who are subject matter specialist was given and an orientation programme was also organized to facilitate easy access to the online books.

Library Management software: The Institute's database of books and documents is managed though the Libsys software. This helps in easy identification of books and documents in the library and DCWC. The entire database of books and documents in the library is also shared with DELNET. The Institute is also a member of Developing Libraries Network (DELNET) which provides inter-library loan facility. There by, the resources of the Institute can also be accessed by other academicians through DELNET and books as well as documents can be given on loan to the user through this service.

8.2 Documentation Centre on Women and Children: The Institute also has a Documentation Centre on Women and Children which is a store house of information related to Women and Children. The Centre keeps documents that have

been classified as per the taxonomy under various fields like Statistics, Policies, Programmes, Education, Health and Nutrition, etc. This Centre is an exclusive centre in the country wherein documents that includes training modules, workshop/ seminar reports/ research tools, IEC material, guidelines etc, related to women and children can be accessed. The Centre serves as a good reference point for faculty of the Institute along with students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling. The Centre is also used for reference work by scholars doing research work from various Universities. The Internship in the Institute, also access the database of DCWC to explore topics for research and the Centre provides them with all the support.

8.3 Special Initiatives to collaborate with Colleges and Universities through the Documentation Centre: The Institute had been leveraging the online platform for organizing various awareness and orientation programmes on health, nutrition, mental health and child protection. DCWC also connects with the faculty, students and scholars from various colleges and orients them on the services offered at the centre. The centre received requests from various scholars for documents and an effort was made to get the information across to them.

8.4 Activities during 2021-22: The following activities were undertaken by DCWC in the area of documentation and dissemination of information during the year 2021-22.

8.4.1 Collection, Documentation and Dissemination of Information from DCWC

During the year 2020-21, DCWC collected about 100 documents from different sources. The Library also subscribes to 10 foreign journals, 28 Indian journals, 21 magazines and 16 newspapers. The Documentation Centre brings out the following publications on monthly/ quarterly basis under the Project titled 'DCWC Regular Activities'.

 DCWC Research Bulletin (A quarterly publication): The Library subscribes to various international and national journals on the subject of health, nutrition, psychology, social



science, and gender. The studies from these journals are abstracted and compiled in the form of DCWC Research Bulletin. The key thematic areas in which abstracts are made include: Child Development/ Mental Health/ Health/Nutrition/ Protection and Women-Nutrition/ Mental Health/ Health/ Empowerment/ Protection of Women against Violence.

- DCWC News Clips: This monthly publication is a compilation of newspaper clippings from 18 newspapers of different regions of the country. The DCWC news clip also has a keyword search feature and all news related to women and children are compiled. The DCWC news clip is also circulated among the officials of Ministry of Women and Child Development.
- DCWC Content Update: The contents page of the journals subscribed by the Institute are scanned and shared with the faculty and students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling. This helps the scholars to check out latest research articles from the Journals.

 DCWC Current Awareness: DCWC shares latest documents that are uploaded on the website of Ministries, Organizations and Institutes. These documents include current guidelines, statistics, fact sheets, training modules that are related to women and children.

8.4.2 Databases

- Database of Documents: All new documents were entered into the computerized Database of Documents using Libsys library software. The software provides easy access to information and a computerized list can be easily generated using keywords.
- Database of Organizations: This Database contains information collected and updated about government departments, autonomous organizations, research institutes, home science colleges, school/ department of social work, medical colleges, voluntary organizations, population research centres and international organizations, etc. Regular update is being carried out.











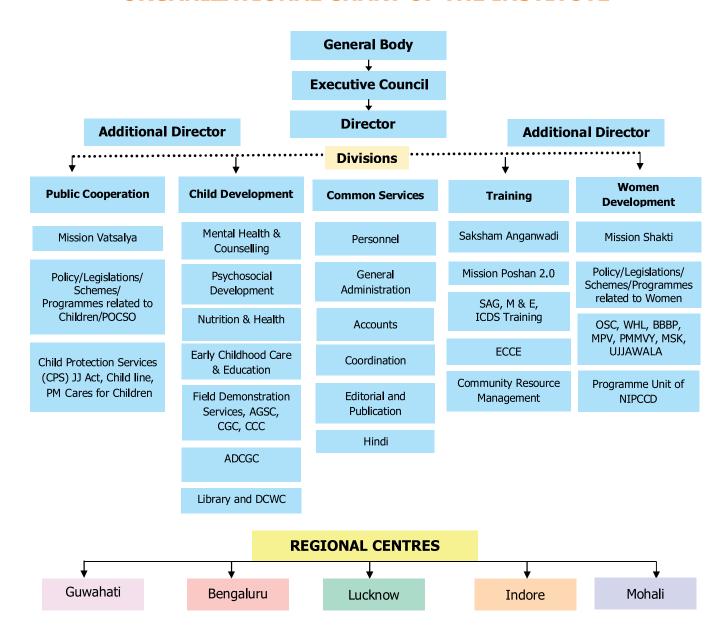

AUDITOR'S REPORT

The General Body National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development 5, Siri Institutional Area, Hauz Khas, New Delhi

Reports on Financial Statements

1. We have audited the attached financial statements of National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (hereinafter referred to as Institute) which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2022 and also Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information annexed thereto.

Management Responsibility for the Financial Statements

2. The management of the Institute is responsible for the preparation of these staterments that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Institute in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles including Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Their responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records for safeguarding the assets of the Institute and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies, making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent, design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatements, whether due to error or fraud.

Auditor's Responsibility

3. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Charted Accountants of India. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risks assessments, the auditor considers internal financial control relevant to the Institute's preparation of the financial statements, that give a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on



whether the Institute has in place adequate internal financial controls system over financial reporting and the operating effectiveness of such controls. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting polices - the financial Institute's management, as well as evaluating the statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion. Incorporated in the financial statements are accounts of Regional Centre-Guwahati, Regional Centre-Bengaluru, Regional Centre-Lucknow, Regional Centre-Indore and Regional Centre-Mohali as audited by us.

Opinion

4. In our opinion and to the best of our information and explanation given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India of the state of affairs of the Institute as at 31st March, 2022 and Excess of Income over expenditure for the year ended on that date.

- ii) Non-adjustment of Advance given to PWD Raipur amounting to Rs.38.04 lakh given in earlieryear.

- vii) It has been observed at Mohali Regional Office, the Security services contract was for the Year 2020-21 which was awarded on 27/10/2020 was valid for one year on the basis of 1 in Service charges and Uniform washing allowance. In the comparison sheet M/s Tusa Security Agency Mohali (Punjab) was quoted for lowest Service charges @0.49% and washing allowance NIL in comparison to M/s Triumph Services India Pvt. Ltd. charging service charges @ 3% and washing allowance of Rs. 200/- per person. The contract was wrongly awarded to Triumph Services at higher rates.
- vil) It has been observed at Mohali and Bengaluru regional centres on sample checking basis, that the Attendance records of Contractual staff has not been verified from the independent source by Administration Section. In Mohali Centre on 01/01/2022 few employees were present as per gate record but marked absent as per contractor attendance record.

- ix) It has been observed at Bengaluru regional centre on the basis of random checking, one of voucher paid on the basis of a Photocopy of bill Rs.4130/- and without passed by DDO.
- x) It has been observed at Bengaluru regional office one Service Provider E Shiva kumar Caterers Providing the services of Caterers and Manpower supply services both. On verification of bill it has been observed that for manpower supply vendor issue the GEM invoice and for catering services issue the bill in separate format., On the catering bill GST was not charged but on the Manpower supply bill GST was charged.

5. We further report that

- (i) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
- (ii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts as required by law have been kept by the Institute so far as appears from our examination of those books;
- (iii) The Balance Sheet and Statement of Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this Report are in agreement with books of account;
- (iv) In our opinion, the aforesaid financial statements comply with the applicable Accounting, Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India except where disclosed otherwise.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS

A. Introduction:

National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development popularly known as NIPCCD, is a premier organisation devoted to Promotion of voluntary action research, training and documentation in the overall domain of women and child development. Established in New Delhi in the year 1966 under Societies Registration Act of 1860. It is an Autonomous Body under the aegis of the Ministry of Women and Child Development. In order to cater to the region-specific requirements of the country, the Institute, over period of time, has established five Regional Centres at Guwahati (1978), Bengaluru (1980), Lucknow (1982), Indore (2001) and Mohali (2019).

The Institute functions as an apex institution for training functionaries of the Anganwadi Services under Umbrella ICDS. As a nodal resource agency, it has also been entrusted with the responsibility of training and Capacity building of functionaries at the national and regional level, under the scheme of Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS). It has also been designated as the nodal institution for imparting training on two important issues of Child Rights and Prevention of Trafficking of Women Children for SAARC Countries by the Ministry of Women and Child Development.

B. SIGNIFICANTACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. General

Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

- (i) The Financial statements have been prepared and presented under historical cost convention on accrual basis of accounting unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting on going concern basis.
- (ii) The accounts of the Institute are Prepared as per the proforma prescribed by the Government of India vide its letter dated 26" May, 1999 wherever applicable to that extent and as further amended by Sixty Eighth meeting of the Executive Council held on 09.02.2016 notified vide Office Order No. Ni/Accts./II/5/2015-16 dated 31.03.2016.
- (iii) The Financial statements includes the financial statements of Headquarter (Delhi) and Regional Centres at Guwahati, Bengaluru, Lucknow, Indore and Mohali.

Use of Estimates

The Preparation of financial statements requires the management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) as of date of the financial statements and the reported income and expenses for the reporting period. Management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable.



2. Revenue Recognition

- (i) The sources of funds of the organisation is primarily the grant received from Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India. Grants received to meet of the expenditure on capital nature (to the extent utilized in the year) are treated as Capital Fund. Grants for meeting the revenue expenditure are treated as income of the year in which they are realized, except that they will be treated as accrued income where sanctions have been issued up to the last day of the year and there is reasonable certainty of collection and realization.
- (ii) Bank Interest are accounted on receipt basis. Class Room and Hostel Charges, Fees received from ADCGC Students, Fee received from the participants as Registration Charges and misc. receipts are treated as user charges of the Institute.
- (iii) The unspent balances of Grants, interest earned on Savings Bank Account are refundable to MWCD in the succeeding year, unless otherwise stated.
- (iv) Interest on investment of CPF/ GPF Funds has been accounted on accrual basis.

3. Fixed Assets and Depreciation

- (i) Fixed Assets are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment, if any. Costs directly attributable to acquisition are not capitalized until the assets are ready for use, as intended by the management.
- (ii) Assets acquired out of sponsored project funds are treated as Institute's Assets.
- (iii) Assets received as Gratis from various agencies are treated as assets of the Institute and valued at cost, by corresponding credit to Capital Reserve.
- (iv) No Assets have been revalued during the year.

(b) Depreciation

- (i) Depreciation on Fixed Assets is charged at the rates prescribed under Income Tax Act, 1961 on written-down value method.
- (ii) Assets costing less than Rs.10,000 and Books Periodicals-Depreciation is charged at the rate of 100% since 2003-2004.
- (iii) Depreciation on various Fixed Assets received as Gratis is charges at the rate of 20% since 2003-2004 as decided by the Management.

4. Investment

Investment being of permanent nature are, carried at cost.

5. Employee Benefits

- (I) Short Term Benefits
 Short term benefits like salary, allowances expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees are recognized as an expense during the period when the employees render the services.
- (ii) Defined Contribution Plan
 The Institute's contribution to defined contribution scheme such as Contributory Provident



Fund, New Pension Scheme are charged to the Income and Expenditure Accounts as and when incurred.

(iii) Defined Benefit Plan

The Institute also provides gratuity benefits to the employees, which is also charges to Grant received from the Govt. of India. As approved by the Executive Council in its Meeting held on 31% March, 2004, the liability in respect of gratuity, pension and leave encashment up to the year end is determined by actual valuation made by the Institute.

1. Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India has released Rs. 4445.66 Lakh as Grant-in-Aid during the financial year 2021-22 for activities under following budget heads.

- The Institute acknowledges the liability towards any expenditure at the time when it has been approved by the Competent Authority for payment and accordingly deducts TDS and GST at that time. As such, Institute has not deducted TDS on the provisions of expenditure made during the year 2021-22.
- 4. Some fixed assets of the Institute have revalued in the year 2003 & 2004, however assets as per valuation report with books of accounts have been adjusted accordingly along with the corresponding adjustment in Depreciation.
- 5. Central Project Support Unit (CPSU) of Rural Women's Development and Empowerment (Swa-Shakti) Project had been shifted to NIPCCD w.e.f. 01.07.2002. As per the agreement with Ministry of Women and Child Development, the bank account related to CPSU would be maintained by the Institute. The Institute would release the funds to CPSU on receipt of funds from the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. on India. Now, the CPSU unit has been closed w.e.f. Dec, 2005 and unspent balance of Rs. 37,84,895.65 only lying in the Bank of CPSU which will be transferred to NIPCCD on close of Account on the receipt of approval from MWCD.
- 6. Rs. 1.82 Lakh has been shown as "Suspense Account" in the Balance Sheet under the head



Current Assets represents the amount misappropriated by a former cashier Shri H.C. Changra and the matter is still subjudice.

- 7. The balance under Sundry Creditors (Schedule 3) and Sundry Debtors (Schedule 9) are mostly dues/receivables from various government department(s). Similarly the balances from Loan and Advances (Schedule 8) and Current liability (Schedule 4) are not confirmed and are pending for approval of necessary adjustment from the concerned department.
- 8. Contingent Liability: Ex-employee(s) of the Institute has filed a case in the Delhi High Court against his dismissal. Under directive issued by Hon'ble High Court of Delhi an amount of Rs.4.91 Lakhs was deposited with the respective authorities shown as Deposit against Contingent Liability under Schedule 8 of Annual Accounts. As per direction of the Court, Rs.20.00 Lac has been paid to Dr. Tejinder Kaur as interim payment, which reflect as outstanding under Contingent Advance.
- 9. The Institute utilizes the Capital Grant for the purchases of fixed assets and treated it as Capital Fund, However, to comply with instructions received from Ministry of HRD vide D.O Letter n0.1703/JS & FA (HRD)/2/2002 dated 19" March, 2002 the Institute has started charging depreciation on cost of assets (Refer Accounting Policy No.3). The Depreciation is not routed through Income and Expenditure as the entire cost of assets has already been reduced from grant received by it in the year of purchase. The above is only for disclosure purpose and has been shown by way of deduction from assets (Schedule No.7 and 12) and from Capital Fund (Schedule 1 and 5).
- 10. The Investment under CPF/GPF is made only in Government related securities and debt related securities as per pattern prescribed by the Ministry of Finance. No investment is made by Institute in Equities as prescribed by Government of India.

11. Taxation

In view of there being no income taxable under the Income Tax Act, 1961, no provision for Income tax has been considered necessary.

12. The Institute accounts it's liability of retirement and terminal benefits on estimated basis every year and the provisions for retirement benefits for the year 2020-21 is Rs.4,369.77 Lakh Previous Year figures have been re-grouped, re-casted and re-arranged wherever considered necessary.

13. 'Schedule-1' to 'Schedule-20' form an integral part of the Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account and have been \duly authenticated.

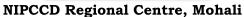
