It gives me immense sense of pride to present **Annual Report 2022-23**, as we continue to assess the achievements of National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD). Throughout the year, NIPCCD has remained dedicated to promoting high-quality systems, providing impactful training, offering counselling services, and assisting the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD) in implementing gender-focused policies, plans, and programmes.

As we navigate the constantly changing landscape of social challenges, NIPCCD continues to strive for excellence. It consistently supports the training and capacity building of stakeholders in various umbrella schemes of MWCD. Additionally, the Institute maintains its excellence in conducting workshops and consultations for voluntary organizations and task force members involved in scheme implementation. In the fiscal year 2022-2023, NIPCCD successfully conducted 460 programmes, both online and offline. The Headquarters hosted 152 programmes, while Regional Centres at Mohali, Bengaluru, Guwahati, Lucknow, and Indore organized 308 programmes addressing regional training needs in the development of women and children.

NIPCCD has also made significant contributions in the field of mental health and counselling by providing a total of 5406 consultations to children and adolescents through its Child Guidance Centre and Adolescent Guidance Service Centre. In addition, NIPCCD also offers a one-year Diploma Course, Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling (ADCGC), at its Headquarters and the Regional Centre in Guwahati.

Throughout the year 2022-23, NIPCCD has implemented various initiatives focused on empowering women and promoting children's development. One noteworthy event was the National Consultation on the Prohibition of Child Marriage (Amendment) Bill 2021 attended by the elected representatives of Panchayati Raj. An online National Consultation on Anti-Human Trafficking of Women and Children engaged 3751 Railway Protection Force (RPF) officials.

NIPCCD reaffirmed its dedication to child protection through organizing 11 Regional Consultations on the Juvenile Justice Amendment Act 2021, Rules 2022, and Adoption Regulations 2022 for District Magistrates (DMs) and Assistant District Magistrates (ADMs). The Institute, in partnership with SAMVAD-NIMHANS and the Department of Social Welfare, Mizoram, also hosted a Training Programme on Effective Counselling Skills which was attended by participants from Child Care Institutions and District Child Protection Units across 11 Districts of Mizoram.

In another notable initiative, NIPCCD Regional Centre, Mohali, organized comprehensive training programmes for Anganwadi Workers in Ladakh on Saksham Anganwadi/Mission Poshan 2.0. In order to promote the goals of Mission Poshan 2.0, NIPCCD also





conducted a Training of Trainers on Poshan Tracker and Height/Weight Measurement for ICDS Functionaries. Additionally, a training session was held in 15 Utkarsh Districts by a team comprising officials from NIPCCD, FNB, and NeGD. The National Seminar on Indigenous Toys for Nurturing Early Childhood Development engaged Anganwadi workers and indigenous toy makers across India.

NIPCCD observed "Special Campaign 2.0" of Swachhata Abhiyan in October 2022. The event was graced by Hon'ble Minister of Women and Child Development, Smt. Smriti Zubin Irani. Under the campaign, clearing out spaces, weeding out old files and ewaste, and various outreach activities and convergent activities were carried out in collaboration with MCD, and the National Archives of India for archiving old books, videos and documentaries.

As we reflect on the contents of this report, let it serve as a testament to the shared vision, dedication, and collaborative spirit that defines NIPCCD.

Lastly, I would like to express my profound gratitude to MWCD for their continued guidance and steadfast support. Their collective commitment to our mission has been a guiding force, and we are grateful for the collaborative synergy that has enhanced our collective impact.


#### **IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES DURING THE PERIOD OF 2022-23**

#### **Training and Capacity Building**

The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) actively engages in training as a core component of its activities. The training programmes organized by NIPCCD comprehensively encompass major initiatives of the Ministry of Women and Child Development, such as Mission Poshan, Mission Vatsalaya and Mission Shakti. In addition to offline programmes, it is significant to note that NIPCCD has expanded its reach by hosting training programs on online platforms, thus adopting modern and accessible methods of sharing knowledge.

During the fiscal year 2022-2023, the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) accomplished a noteworthy milestone by successfully conducting a total of 460 comprehensive programmes, encompassing both online and offline modalities. These initiatives spanned a diverse array of activities, including orientation courses, sensitization and skill training sessions, workshops, and consultations/review meetings, diligently addressing a spectrum of schemes under the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD) and contemporary themes.


The NIPCCD Headquarters played a pivotal role by hosting 152 programmes, while the Regional Centres situated in Mohali, Bengaluru, Guwahati, Lucknow, and Indore collectively organized 308 programmes. This strategic distribution effectively catered to regional training needs in the domain of women and child development.





Among the 460 programmes, a significant emphasis was placed on Capacity Building of Anganwadi Services Scheme Functionaries, constituting 164 programmes (36%). Following closely, 129 programmes (28%) were dedicated to Child Protection, 80 programmes (17%) delved into issues related to Women Development, and 85 programmes (19%) specifically addressed topics related to Child Development, including Mental Health.












The impact of these initiatives is underscored by the substantial participation of 32,288 participants in the training programmes throughout the fiscal year. Notably, the Headquarters hosted 15,220 participants, with Regional Centres in Mohali (3,897), Bengaluru (3,117), Guwahati (2,408), Lucknow (5318) and Indore (2,328) contributing significantly to the overall participant numbers. This comprehensive effort signifies NIPCCD's commitment to capacitate and address crucial aspects of women and child development nationwide.



### Capacity Building of Functionaries of Anganwadi Services Scheme under Umbrella ICDS

Children serve as the bedrock of a nation, thus prioritizing their well-being is paramount for the advancement and prosperity of any country. Recognizing this fundamental principle, the government of India has introduced the Saksham Anganwadi and Poshan 2.0. This initiative aims to tackle the pervasive challenges of malnutrition affecting children, adolescent girls,





pregnant women, and lactating mothers. Central to its approach is a strategic reorientation of nutrition content and delivery mechanisms.

The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD), functioning as the apex institution for the training of Anganwadi service functionaries, has played a pivotal role in facilitating the successful implementation of Saksham Anganwadi and Poshan 2.0. Through its concerted efforts, NIPCCD has fostered the creation of a convergent ecosystem conducive to the program's objectives. This ecosystem encompasses various stakeholders and resources, fostering collaboration and synergy to address malnutrition comprehensively. It is noteworthy to mention that NIPCCD (Headquarters and Regional Centers) conducted a comprehensive number of 164 training programmes, strategically organized to enhance the capacities of Anganwadi functionaries at both headquarters and regional centers. In these programs more focus was put on the topics such as nutrition, early childhood care, education, monitoring, supervision, and community mobilization efforts. Evidently this capacity-building aspect has been instrumental in enhancing the quality and effectiveness of nutrition-related services rendered at the grassroots level. By harnessing the collective efforts and comprehensive capacity building NIPCCD has laid the groundwork for a healthier, more resilient future generation, thereby driving the nation towards inclusive development and socio-economic advancement.

#### **Child Protection**

The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) has assumed a pivotal role in spearheading child protection initiatives, focusing on enhancing the capabilities and knowledge of officials engaged in implementing the Child Protection Service Scheme. Through a series of comprehensive training programs conducted at both national and regional levels, NIPCCD endeavours to standardize and optimize child protection efforts across diverse administrative jurisdictions, thereby fostering a safer environment for children nationwide. The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) has demonstrated a steadfast commitment to child protection through the organization of 129 programmes covering a spectrum of themes crucial to safeguarding children's well-being.

Furthermore, to support the effective implementation of schemes such as Mission Vatsalaya, and PM CARES for Children NIPCCD organized a series of capacity-building programs targeting various stakeholders, with a particular emphasis on District Child Protection Officers(DCPO's) because they hold a crucial role in executing and guaranteeing the success of child protection schemes at the grassroots level. The stakeholder were given specialized training and resources to enhance their capabilities. The goal was to equip them with the necessary knowledge and skills to effectively carry out their responsibilities within the framework of the Mission Vatsalaya Scheme.

#### **Women Development**

The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) plays a crucial role in advancing gender equality and women's empowerment. Through extensive research and documentation, NIPCCD aims to understand the complexities of women's development, providing evidence-based insights to shape policies and interventions that address the real needs of women. Training is at the core of NIPCCD's mission, as it conducts diverse programs and workshops to drive forward the agenda of women's empowerment. By equipping individuals and organizations with the necessary knowledge and skills, NIPCCD fosters a





supportive environment for women's advancement and contributes to building a more inclusive society.

NIPCCD organized a total of 80 programs meticulously designed to address women-centric issues. These initiatives notably encompassed orientations on the Mission Shakti scheme and its two subsidiary schemes, namely Sambal and Samarthya. Moreover, the programs prioritized gender sensitization, with a particular emphasis on combatting Gender-Based Violence. Noteworthy subjects covered included the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal) Act of 2013 and the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act of 2005. These educational endeavors targeted not only government officials but also civil society organizations, aiming to foster a comprehensive understanding and proactive approach towards these critical legislations and their implementation. Through strategic planning and focused execution, NIPCCD sought to empower women, create safer environments, and promote gender equality across various sectors of society.

#### **Child Development**


The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) strives to achieve global recognition as a leading institution in the realm of child development. In the fiscal year 2022-23, the institute organised a total of 85 programs, each delving into pivotal things such as early childhood development, mental health and wellbeing of children and educational and behavioural challenges including ADHD. Through this comprehensive array of initiatives NIPCCD not only underscores its dedication to addressing the multifaceted interventions of child development but also underscores its commitment to disseminating invaluable knowledge to parents, caregivers, and the academic community. By offering guidance and support to caregivers and educators, NIPCCD endeavours to foster an environment conducive to the holistic growth and well-being of children across various stages of development. The primary emphasis was placed on critical issues like the excessive use of screens by children, nutritional counselling skills and the promotion of correct Infant and Young Child Feeding Practices. These initiatives reflect NIPCC's proactive approach towards tackling contemporary challenges affecting children's health and development.

#### **Child Guidance Service**


The Child Guidance Centre, an integral component of the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD), remains steadfast in delivering high-quality services. The commitment to restoring emotional well-being is palpable, reflecting a dedication to the holistic development and welfare of the children and families served by the Centre. In the fiscal year 2022-23, the Child Guidance Centres across regional centres and headquarter demonstrated its commitment through substantial figures. A noteworthy 581 new cases were officially registered at the Centres, indicative of the persistent need for its services. The Centre's multifaceted approach not only involves direct intervention through new case registrations but also underscores the significance of ongoing support, as evident in the substantial number of follow-up cases. A substantial cohort of 2342 children actively engaged in follow-up sessions, demonstrating the sustained impact of the interventions provided. Total of 4137 consultations were conducted for children and parents alike.







The Adolescent Guidance Service Centre (AGSC) is dedicated to fostering positive mental health among adolescents, with a focus on individuals aged 12-19 years. Embracing a holistic approach through a robust adolescent guidance programme, the centre actively engages in counselling and supportive interventions to facilitate the healthy psychosocial development of young people. In the fiscal year 2022-23, AGSC registered 93 new cases of adolescents seeking assistance. Additionally, the centre conducted counselling sessions for 269 follow-up cases, ensuring ongoing support for those under its care. Furthermore, AGSC provided a noteworthy 1269 consultations encompassing diverse assessments and therapeutic interventions.



#### **Internship Programme**

The NIPCCD offers a comprehensive internship programme to research students, encompassing diverse thematic areas within the realm of women and child development. Through this programme, participants gain valuable insights into the multifaceted landscape of women and child development, contributing to their academic and professional growth. This initiative extends opportunities for hands-on experience and field placements at both headquarters and regional centres, facilitating a practical understanding of the subject matter. In the academic year 2022-23, the institute successfully facilitated the internships and field placements to a cohort of 10 and 23 dedicated research students respectively, who were actively engaged in pursuing research at various universities or colleges.





#### **Special Achievements of NIPCCD**

#### I. National Consultation on Anti-Human Trafficking of Women and Children

An Online National Consultation on Anti-Human Trafficking of Women and Children was held on 30th July, 2022. In the consultation, 3751 RPF officials from various Battalions like Valsad, Kharagpur, and Vizag etc. joined from several places across the country wherein group screenings were organized by the railway officials. In the consultation, concepts; trends and dimensions along with measures for combating trafficking was addressed. Special session on counseling skills for survivors of trafficking was delivered by NIMHANS officials.

#### II. Observance of Special Campaign 2.0 for Swachhata

As per directions of MWCD, NIPCCD undertook special campaign for swachhata from 2nd October, 2022 – 31st October, 2022. In the Pre Assessment Phase of Special Campaign 2.0, NIPCCD identified 36 campaign sites in the field and carried out outreach activities at Child Care Institutions (CCIs), Specialized Adoption Agencies (SAAs) and Women Shelter Homes/ Swadhar Grehs/Ujjawala Homes. In addition, at NIPCCD Headquarters and its Five Regional Centers, Weeding of




e-Waste; Old records & other obsolete items including furniture and electronics were identified for disposal as per laid down rules/procedures. Convergent activities were carried out in collaboration with National Archives of India for archiving old books, videos and documentaries. Special Cleanliness Drive in Selected Rooms of NIPCCD, New Delhi was also carried out.

Union WCD Minister, Smt. Smriti Zubin Irani, visited NIPCCD, New Delhi on 29th October, 2022 and participated in the rejuvenation of Rainwater Harvesting System and tree plantation drive being organized in the premises. She was also apprised of the old books, videos and documentaries that will be archived in collaboration with the National Archives of India.

#### III. 5th Rashtriya Poshan Maah

Ministry of Women and Child Development celebrated the 5th Rashtriya Poshan Maah, 2022 on 1st-30th September, 2022 with the focus on "Mahila and Swasthya" and "Bacha or Shiksha". As directed by MWCD, NIPCCD conducted about 32 outreach activities across Anganwadi Centers, Child Care Institutions, Panchayats, and Schools & Colleges by faculty of NIPCCD. A month long event witnessed intensive activities across the country for awareness about nutrition at the ground level through sensitization drives, outreach programmes, identification drives, camps and fairs with special focus on pregnant and lactating women, children below six years and adolescent girls, in order to realize the vision of 'Swasth Bharat'. At the Panchayat level, awareness activities were conducted in convergence with local functionaries under the guidance of the concerned District Panchayati Raj Officers and CDPOs.









#### IV. Hindi Pakhwada

'Hindi Pakhwada' was organized from 14th to 30th September, 2022. Many competitions like 'Hindi Lekhan' and 'Hindi Anuwad, Gyan, essay writing and quiz competitions were organized during this period. In addition, 'Hindi Workshops were also organized for the staff and faculty of the Institute to motivate and bring about a positive perception about the language Hindi and to promote Hindi as the official language of India.

#### V. Bharat Parv

National Institute of Pubic Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD), organized a stall from 20" 31" January 2023 showcasing various initiatives of the MWCD for development, safety and protection of women and children.





#### VI. 14th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme

14th Tribal Youth Exchange Programme was organized by Nehru Yuva Kendra (Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India) in association with NIPCCD, Lucknow, on 10–16 February, 2023. The main objectives of the programme were to discuss the challenges and issue faced by the tribal youth; to orient them about constitution rights, life skills, career planning, programmes & schemes of the government, etc.

#### VII. NIPCCD Twitter

NIPCCD's twitter presence has undergone a significant revamp, aimed at enhancing communication and engagement with the stakeholders. 





A total of 3751 participants participated in the programme.

A Workshop on Prevention of Child Trafficking in India for Functionaries of Women Shelters Homes was organised from 20-21 March, 2023 by Regional Centre Mohali with the objectives to: orient the participants about the crime against women and children in India; acquaint the functionaries of women shelter homes on nature, process, magnitude and consequences of trafficking of women children in the region; discuss the challenges in the implementation of existing legal provisions and law to prevent the trafficking of women and children; enable the participants to understand the importance of networking and developing linkages of the stakeholders to combat trafficking in the region; review schemes and programmes of the Govt. of India and State Governments for prevention and control of trafficking and commercial exploitation of women and children and; evolve action plan on the role of women shelter home in the prevention, rescue and rehabilitation of trafficked women and children. A total of 39 participants participated in the workshop.

#### **VIII. OTHERS**

# Field Demonstration & Counselling Services

#### **Field Demonstration & Counseling Services**

The Institute operates comprehensive field demonstration services, catering specifically to the mental health counseling needs of children. These services are not confined solely to its headquarters but extend across regional center, ensuring widespread access to essential mental health support. Additionally, it publishes a variety of materials focusing on topics aligned with its areas of interest. This two-pronged approach aims to offer practical, on-the-ground support for children's mental health while also contributing valuable knowledge and insights through informative publications. Through its commitment to both direct intervention and knowledge dissemination, the institute endeavors to make a positive impact on the mental well-being of children and contribute to a broader understanding of relevant issues.

#### 1. Child Guidance Centre (CGC)

The Child Guidance Centre of the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) serves as the vital hub dedicated to fostering the well-being and development of children. Established with a commitment to addressing the unique needs of young minds, this center specializes in providing expert guidance and counseling services.

Additionally, the center engages in advocacy and community education endeavors to champion the well-being and mental health of children. These efforts involve organizing workshops tailored for teachers, parents and adolescents within the community. Through these workshops, the center strives to promote awareness and understanding, fostering a supportive environment that prioritizes the mental health needs of children.

- During the transitional period spanning from 2022 to 2023, the Child Guidance Centers operating within Regional Centers and the central Headquarters exhibited a commendable commitment to child welfare. Throughout this timeframe, these centers catered to the needs of 581 new registrants, along with 4137 consultations reflecting the ongoing demand for their vital services.
- In response to the evolving landscape of child guidance and mental health, the centers adopted a dynamic approach by implementing a thoughtful blend of online and inperson assessment and intervention services. This strategic combination not only showcased adaptability but also recognized the diverse needs and preferences of the families seeking assistance. Beyond the follow up of 2342 cases, the centers extended their reach to an additional 1076 children by taking up new cases, therefore, offering various intervention services. This broader engagement underscores the centers' dedication to supporting a comprehensive spectrum of children, acknowledging that each case is unique and requires tailored approaches.







- environment for children confronting various difficulties, disabilities, or disorders. Despite this welcoming approach, the nature of conditions disclosed at these centers remains notably challenging. Diverse concerns surface, spanning from intricate learning problems to specific learning disabilities, and encompassing conditions such as Autism Spectrum Disorder and Global Developmental Disorders.
- The multiplicity of reported challenges underscores the significance of these counseling
  centers as comprehensive support hubs. The spectrum of issues reflects the intricate
  tapestry of children's needs and underscores the centers' adaptability in addressing a
  wide array of circumstances. The prevalence of learning problems suggests a critical
  role in educational support, while specific learning disabilities emphasize the need for
  tailored interventions.

#### 2. Outreach work

- Child Guidance Center's nationwide not only focus on clinical work but also actively participate in outreach initiatives. These efforts extend to supporting parents, teachers, and adolescents through diverse activities such as workshops, career talks, and on-site interventions for children and caregivers in Child Care Institutions (CCIs). Recognizing the pivotal role of early intervention, these centers emphasize the importance of timely access to healthcare for children. The impact of early treatment is profound, significantly enhancing a child's performance in school while mitigating the risk of adverse outcomes like academic failure and mental health issues.
- By engaging in a multifaceted approach that encompasses both clinical services and outreach programs, the Child Guidance Centers contribute to fostering a holistic environment that nurtures the well-being and development of children. This comprehensive strategy not only addresses immediate clinical needs but also proactively seeks to create a supportive network for parents, educators, and young individuals, ultimately promoting positive long-term outcomes for children's mental health and academic success.
- For instance a Training Programme Addressing Learning and Behaviour Difficulties in Children for School Teachers was organized on 28-29 April, 2022 by Regional Centre, Guwahati with the objectives to: sensitize the school teachers toward various Learning and Behaviour difficulties in children; and orient the school teachers toward classroom





management of various Learning and Behaviour difficulties in children. Twenty-three participants attended the programme. Similarly, Sensitization and Awareness Programme for School Teachers on "Importance of Early Identification of Learning and Behavioral Issues among Children" was organized on 30 July,2022 by Regional Centre, Lucknow with the objectives to sensitize the participants on psycho-social concerns related to children; familiarize the participants with the learning and behavioral problems of children; develop their skills in identification of these problems; enable the participants to develop a strategy for seeking timely intervention for children from specialized agencies; and address the challenges encountered by the teachers in classroom settings.

#### 3. Workshop for Adolescents

- Ensuring the safe return of adolescents to school and fostering quality learning in a
  conducive environment is of utmost importance. Adolescents merit special attention,
  emphasizing the promotion of a healthy lifestyle. It is crucial to safeguard not only
  their physical well-being but also attend to their psychological and emotional needs.
  Recognizing this, the significance of organizing life skills workshops for adolescents
  becomes evident.
- Workshop on Promoting Healthy Lifestyle with Adolescents was organized on 30 April, 2022 by NIPCCD, Headquarters, New Delhi with the objective to: understand the strategies for maintaining healthy lifestyle; reflect and identify their own strengths, abilities and values; evaluate their patterns of managing time and learn to prioritize and manage their daily activities. Fifty six participants attended the Programme. Another Training Programme was organized on Promoting Life Skills Development for Adolescents in CCIs was organized from 22-24 June, 2022 by NIPCCD, Headquarters, New Delhi with the objectives to: orient the participants about developmental needs of adolescents; provide insight on Life Skills and methodology of transacting Life Skills among Adolescents; and apprise the participants on legislations for protection of children. Similarly, various other training programs were organized which played a pivotal role in addressing their holistic development, aiming to equip them with essential skills beyond academic realms.

#### 4. Internship at CGC

- Child Guidance Centers and Adolescent Guidance & Service Centers, both at the
  headquarters and in regional branches, employ an additional avenue for community
  engagement through internship programs. These initiatives extend mentorship to
  aspiring students across diverse social science disciplines, providing a pivotal platform
  for experiential learning and skill refinement. The primary objective is to cultivate a
  profound interest in the realm of mental health.
- These internships unfold as dynamic opportunities for participants to immerse themselves in various facets of the field. Through active engagement in case discussions, clinical case observations, and exposure to career counseling, students undergo a comprehensive exploration of mental health practices. This hands-on approach enables them to develop a nuanced understanding of the complexities inherent in the discipline. Moreover, interns are afforded the chance to delve into case report writing, scoring, and interpretation. This multifaceted exposure equips them






with practical insights into the methodologies employed in mental health assessments. The emphasis on practical skills complements theoretical knowledge, fostering a wellrounded educational experience.

By providing a real-world context for their studies, the centers contribute to the professional development of the next generation of mental health practitioners. The mentorship aspect ensures that these budding professionals receive guidance and support from seasoned experts, facilitating a seamless transition from academic learning to practical application.

#### 5. Adolescent Guidance and Service Center

The heart of AGSC's efforts lies in its comprehensive adolescent guidance program, which seamlessly integrates counseling and supportive interventions. This holistic approach is designed to cater to the nuanced needs of adolescents, recognizing the intricate interplay between mental and emotional well-being during this critical developmental phase.

- The Adolescent Guidance and Service Centre (AGSC) is dedicated to advancing the positive mental health of adolescents through a robust adolescent guidance program. The center focuses on fostering the healthy psychosocial development of young individuals aged 12 to 19. In the period spanning 2022-2023, AGSC encountered and addressed a total of 93 new cases involving adolescents who sought support and guidance.
- The center's impact extends beyond initial consultations, with nearly 269 follow-up cases receiving ongoing counseling. This highlights AGSC's commitment to providing sustained support to adolescents as they navigate the complexities of adolescence. The follow-up cases underscore the center's dedication to not only addressing immediate concerns but also ensuring a continuum of care that aids in the enduring mental health of these individuals.
- Furthermore, AGSC facilitated over 1269 consultations, encompassing a diverse array of assessments and therapeutic interventions. These consultations exemplify the center's versatility in tailoring its services to meet the unique requirements of each adolescent. Whether through assessments to understand specific needs or therapies aimed at fostering resilience and coping mechanisms, AGSC's interventions are tailored to empower adolescents on their journey toward positive mental health.













# Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling

## I. ADCGC at NIPCCD, New Delhi in affiliation with Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi

The Institute launched the Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling in the year 2005 to address the need for trained manpower to work in the area of child and adolescent mental health. The course is under affiliation with Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi and is also recognized from Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI). So far the Institute has organized sixteen batches of the course. The Advanced Diploma has been designed to bridge the gap of availability of trained professionals for undertaking counseling and guidance of children and families in different settings. It has been planned with a Developmental, Ecological and Rights Perspective to enable the learner to function effectively as a mental health professional with an updated understanding of theoretical constructs, and the requisite skills. The inherent emphasis of the programme is on 'Development of Self' and 'Acquisition of Skills' through experiential and action learning.

The course envisions to create professional and personal growth opportunities for those working with children and child- related systems so as to enable children to actualize their potential.

Presently Eighteenth Batch (XVIII) of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling is running with enrolment of 29 students holding a Postgraduate Degree in Social Work/ Psychology/ Child Development.

#### II. ADCGC at Regional Centre, Guwahati in affiliation with Guwahati University

The Regional Centre, Guwahati inaugurated the One Year Advance Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling on October 20, 2021. The course is initiated with the objective to cater to the need for trained mental health professionals and counsellors in the Northeastern Region of India. The diploma is affiliated to Guwahati University. The total students' capacity is 20. A total of 20 students are presently pursuing the diploma course (2022-23).



# Documentation Centre on Women & Children (DCWC)

Library: The Institute has a full-fledged Library were in there is collection of books on various issues related to Women and Children. The library has a dedicated section for reference books and Hindi. The library of the Institute also subscribes to various International and National Journals. Library provides comfortable reading room to readers where in scholars, academicians, interns and students from other Universities also come to do reference work. The wide collection of books cater to the academic needs of students from many specializations like social work, psychology, women studies, gender studies, public health and nutrition etc.

**Online subscription:** This year a new initiative was taken by the Institute to subscribe to online books. The institute subscribed to Pearson online library for the faculty as well students of Advanced Diploma students at New Delhi and Guwahati. These online books provided easy access to readers related to various subjects pertaining to the work of the Institute. The access to all these books selected by the faculty from all Regional Centres who are subject matter specialist was given and an orientation programme was also organized to facilitate easy access to the online books.

**Library Management software:** The institute's database of books and documents is being managed in the Libsys software. This helps in easy identification of books and documents in the library and DCWC. The entire database of books and documents in the library is also shared with DELNET. The Institute is also a member of Developing Libraries Network (DELNET) which provides inter library loan facility. So the resources of the Institute are also accessed by other academicians through DELNET and books as well as documents are given on loan to the user through this service.

- II. Documentation Centre on Women and Children: The Institute also has a Documentation Centre on Women and Children which is a store house of information related to Women and Children. The centre keeps documents that have been classified as per the taxonomy under various fields like Statistics, Policies, Programmes, Education, Health and Nutrition etc. This centre is an exclusive centre in the country where in documents that includes training modules, workshop/ seminar reports/ research tools, IEC material, guidelines etc. related to women and children can be accessed. The centre serves as a good reference point for faculty of the Institute along with students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling. The centre is also used for reference work by scholars doing research work from various Universities. Every year the Institute has students who come for doing their internship in the Institute, these students also access the database of DCWC to explore topics for research and the centre provides them with all the support.
- III. Special Initiatives to collaborate with Colleges and Universities through the Documentation Centre: The institute had been leveraging the online platform for organizing various awareness and orientation programmes on health, nutrition, mental





health child protection. So DCWC also got connected to the faculty, students and scholars from various colleges and oriented them on the services offered at the centre. The centre received requests from various scholars for documents and an attempt was made to get the information across to them.

**IV. Activities during 2022-23:** The following activities were undertaken by DCWC in the area of documentation and dissemination of information during the year 2022-23

#### Collection, Documentation and Dissemination of Information from DCWC

During the year 2022-23, DCWC had collected about 100 documents from different sources. The Library also subscribes to 5 foreign journals, 15 Indian journals, 21 magazines and 18 newspapers. The Documentation Centre brings out the following publications on monthly/ quarterly basis under the Project titled 'DCWC Regular Activities'.

- DCWC News Clips: This monthly publication is a compilation of newspaper clippings from 18 newspapers of different regions of the country. The DCWC news clip also had keyword search feature and all news related to women and children is compiled. The DCWC news clip is also circulated to the officials of Ministry of Women and Child Development.
- DCWC Content Update: the contents page of the journals subscribed by the Institute
  are scanned and shared with the faculty and students of Advanced Diploma in Child
  Guidance and Counselling. This helps the scholars to check out latest research articles
  from the Journals.
- DCWC Current Awareness: DCWC shares latest documents that are uploaded on the website of Ministries, Organizations and Institutes. These documents include current guidelines, statistics, fact sheets, training modules that are related to women and children.

#### **Databases**

- **Database of Documents**: All new documents were entered into the computerized Database of Documents using Libsys library software. The software provides easy access to information and a computerized list can be easily generated using keywords.
- Database of Organizations: This Database contains information collected and updated about government departments, autonomous organizations, research institutes, home science colleges, school/ departments of social work, medical colleges, voluntary organizations, population research centres and international organizations, etc. Regular update is being carried out.



#### **Reports on Financial Statements**

1. We have audited the attached financial statements of National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (hereinafter referred to as Institute) which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2023 and also Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information annexed thereto.

#### Management Responsibility for the Financial Statements

2. The management of the Institute is responsible for the preparation of these statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Institute in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles including Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. - iii) Non-adjustment of advances given to CPWD amounting to Rs.2,65,23,162/-and Rs.96,031 given in earlier years.
- iv) Non-adjustment of provision created in previous years for provision for capitalisation of assets Rs.5.51 lakhs.
- v) Advances related to Hausla 2018 amounting to Rs. 104.26 Lacs and Hausla 2019 Rs. 60.06Lacs is still pending for the recovery from Ministry of woman and child welfare.
- vi) User charge Liability for Rs. 216.55 Lacs has been carried by the Institute for last 4 years and Rs. 469.32 lacs received during the year was also lying deposited in Canara Bank.
- vii) During the year, an escrow account with NHA opened at Canara Bank, Hauz Khas for providing medical facilities to the beneficiaries of scheme for PM Care for Childrens, where Rs. 24,88,399/- is lying as on 31 March 2023.

(i) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;

- (ii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts as required by law have been kept by the Institute so far as appears from our examination of those books;

#### SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS

#### A. Introduction:

National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development popularly known as NIPCCD, is a premier organisation devoted to promotion of voluntary action research, training and documentation in the overall domain of women and child development. Established in New Delhi in the year 1966 under Societies Registration Act of 1860. It is an Autonomous Body under the aegis of the Ministry of Women and Child Development. In order to cater to the region-specific requirements of the country, the Institute, over period of time, has established five Regional Centres at Guwahati (1978), Bangalore (1980), Lucknow (1982), Indore (2001) and Mohali (2019).

The Institute functions as an apex institution for training functionaries of the Anganwadi Services under Umbrella ICDS. As a nodal resource agency, it has also been entrusted with the responsibility of training and capacity building of functionaries at the national and regional level, under the scheme of Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS). It has also been designated as the nodal institution for imparting training on two important issues of Child Rights and Prevention of Trafficking of Women Children for SAARC Countries by the Ministry of Women and Child Development.

#### **B. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

#### 1. General

#### **Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements**

- (i) The Financial statements have been prepared and presented under historical cost convention on accrual basis of accounting unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting on going concern basis.
- (ii) The accounts of the Institute are prepared as per the proforma prescribed by the Government of India vide its letter dated 26<sup>th</sup> May, 1999 wherever applicable to that extent and as further amended by Sixty Eighth meeting of the Executive Council held on 09.02.2016 notified vide Office Order No. NI/Accts./II/5/2015-16 dated 31.03.2016.
- (iii) The Financial statements includes the financial statements of Headquarter (Delhi) and Regional Centres at Guwahati, Bengaluru, Lucknow, Indore and Mohali.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The Preparation of financial statements requires the management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) as of date of the financial statements and the reported income and expenses for the reporting period. Management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable.

#### 2. Revenue Recognition

- (i) The sources of funds of the organisation is primarily the grant received from Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India. Grants received to meet of the expenditure on capital nature (to the extent utilized in the year) are treated as Capital Fund. Grants for meeting the revenue expenditure are treated as income of the year in which they are realized, except that they will be treated as accrued income where sanctions have been issued up to the last day of the year and there is reasonable certainty of collection and realization.
- (ii) Bank Interest are accounted on receipt basis. Class Room and Hostel Charges, Fees received from ADCGC Students, Fee received from the participants as Registration Charges and misc. receipts are treated as user charges of the Institute.
- (iii) The unspent balances of Grants, interest earned on Saving Bank Account are refundable to MWCD in the succeeding year, unless otherwise stated.
- (iv) Interest on investment of CPF/ GPF Funds has been accounted on accrual basis.

#### 3. Fixed Assets and Depreciation

- (i) Fixed Assets are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment, if any. Costs directly attributable to acquisition are not capitalized until the assets are ready for use, as intended by the management.
- (ii) Assets acquired out of sponsored projects funds are treated as Institute's Assets.
- (iii) Assets received as Gratis from various agencies are treated as assets of the Institute and valued at cost, by corresponding credit to Capital Reserve.
- (iv) No Assets have been revalued during the year.

#### (b) Depreciation

- (i) Depreciation on Fixed Assets is charged at the rates prescribed under Income Tax Act, 1961 on written-down value method.
- (ii) Assets costing less than Rs.10,000 and Books Periodicals-Depreciation is charged at the rate of 100% since 2003-2004.
- (iii) Depreciation on various Fixed Assets received as Gratis is charges at the rate of 20% since 2003-2004 as decided by the Management.

#### 4. Investment

Investment being of permanent nature are, carried at cost.

#### 5. Employee Benefits

(i) Short Term Benefits

Short term benefits like salary, allowances expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees are recognized as an expenses during the period when the employees render the services.

(ii) Defined Contribution Plan

The Institute's contribution to defined contribution scheme such as Contributory Provident Fund, New Pension Scheme are charged to the Income and Expenditure Accounts as and when incurred.

(iii) Defined Benefit Plan

The Institute also provides gratuity benefits to the employees, which is also charges to Grant received from the Govt. of India. As approved by the Executive Council in its Meeting held on 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2004, the liability in respect of gratuity, pension and leave encashment up to the year end is determined by actual valuation made by the Institute.

- 3. The Institute acknowledges the liability towards any expenditure at the time when it has been approved by the Competent Authority for payment and accordingly deducts TDS and GST at that time. As such, Institute has not deducted TDS on the provisions of expenditure made during the year 2022-23
- 4. Some fixed assets of the Institute have revalued in the year 2003 & 2004, however assets as per valuation report with books of accounts have been adjusted accordingly along with the corresponding adjustment in Depreciation.
- 5. Central Project Support Unit (CPSU) of Rural Women's Development and Empowerment (Swa-Shakti) Project had been shifted to NIPCCD w.e.f. 01.07.2002. As per the agreement with Ministry of Women and Child Development, the bank account related to CPSU would be maintained by the Institute. The Institute would release the funds to CPSU on receipt of funds from the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. on India. Now, the CPSU unit has been closed w.e.f. Dec, 2005 and unspent balance of Rs. 38,90,551.25 only lying in the Bank of CPSU which will be transferred to NIPCCD on close of Account on the receipt of approval from MWCD.
- 6. Rs. 1.82 Lakh has been shown as "Suspense Account" in the Balance Sheet under the head Current Assets represents the amount misappropriated by a former cashier Shri H.C. Changra and the matter is still subjudice.
- 7. The balance under Sundry Creditors (Schedule 3) and Sundry Debtors (Schedule 9) are mostly dues/receivables from various government department(s). Similarly the balances from Loan and Advances (Schedule 8) and Current liability (Schedule 4) are not confirmed and are pending for approval of necessary adjustment from the concerned department.

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- 8. Contingent Liability: Ex-employee(s) of the Institute has filed a case in the Delhi High Court against his dismissal. Under directive issued by Hon'ble High Court of Delhi an amount of Rs.4.91 Lakhs was deposited with the respective authorities shown as Deposit against Contingent Liability under Schedule 8 of Annual Accounts. As per direction of the Court, Rs.20.00 Lac has been paid to Dr. Tejinder Kaur as interim payment, which reflect as outstanding under Contingent Advance.
- 9. The Institute utilizes the Capital Grant for the purchases of fixed assets and treated it as Capital Fund. However, to comply with instructions received from Ministry of HRD vide D.O Letter no.1703/JS & FA (HRD)/2/2002 dated 19<sup>th</sup> March, 2002 the Institute has started charging depreciation on cost of assets (Refer Accounting Policy No.3). The Depreciation is not routed through Income and Expenditure as the entire cost of assets has already been reduced from grant received by it in the year of purchase. The above is only for disclosure purpose and has been shown by way of deduction from assets (Schedule No.7 and 12) and from Capital Fund (Schedule 1 and 5).
- 10. The Investment under CPF/GPF is made only in Government related securities and debt related securities as per pattern prescribed by the Ministry of Finance. No investment is made by Institute in Equities as prescribed by Government of India.
- 11. Taxation
  - In view of there being no income taxable under the Income Tax Act, 1961, no provision for Income tax has been considered necessary.
- 12. The Institute accounts it's liability of retirement and terminal benefits on estimated basis every year and the provisions for retirement benefits for the year 2022-23 is Rs.4,699.06 Lakh
- 13. Previous Year figures have been re-grouped, re-casted and re-arranged wherever considered necessary.

14. 'Schedule-1' to 'Schedule-20' form an integral part of the Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account and have been duly authenticated.




